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Regulating Carbon

EPA rules under the Clean Air Act aren't the way to do the job. But a carefully crafted tax might be.

THE ENVIRONMENTAL Protection Agency has told the White House that global warming is endangering public health and welfare, The Post's Juliet Eilperin <u>reported</u> yesterday. This "finding" under the Clean Air Act may seem like a no-brainer, given the potential ill effects of climate change. But that law, enacted in 1970, was never intended to deal with greenhouse gases and is not suited to that task. The Bush administration's failure to tackle climate change directly drove states and environmental advocates to seek back-door paths to regulation. If this one goes forward, the EPA would have to regulate greenhouse gases from all sources, including cars, houses and commercial buildings. This would create what Rep. John Dingell (D-Mich.) has <u>called</u> "a glorious mess." Congress should avert it putting a price on carbon. Such a market-based solution could be accomplished either through a tax or, as the Obama administration supports, by setting a cap on greenhouse gas emissions and having polluting companies pay for the right to emit. Mr. Obama's budget anticipates collecting \$645.7 billion over the next 10 years from such a cap-and-trade regime. But such a complex system would take time to develop and institute, even if Congress supports it. Laurie Williams and Allan Zabel, two EPA enforcement attorneys for more than 20 years in the agency's San Francisco office and writing as private citizens, released a paper last month advocating a "carbon fee" because, they argue, a cap-and-trade system "will not insure a competitive price advantage for clean energy over fossil fuel energy in the near future." Rajendra Pachauri, chairman of the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, supports cap-and-trade. But when we asked him whether opponents of a carbon tax were right in saying that a tax would not guarantee emissions reduction goals," he said, because it "should lead to a shift to other sources of energy or other technologies that reduce energy use efficiently."

Yes, we know. A carbon tax is a politically unpalatable solution for some. But it has advantages over a complex trading system and should be considered. And either a carbon fee or cap-and-trade would be far superior to bureaucratic regulation under the Clean Air Act.

The <u>Environmental Protection Agency</u>, about to declare heat-trapping gases to be dangerous pollutants, has embarked on one of the most ambitious regulatory challenges in history.

The move is likely to have a profound effect across the economic spectrum, affecting transportation, power plants, oil refineries, cement plants and other manufacturers.

It sets the agency on a collision course with carmakers, coal plants and other businesses that rely on fossil fuels, which fear that the finding will impose complex and costly rules.

But it may also help the Obama administration's efforts to push through a federal law to curb carbon dioxide emissions by drawing industry support for legislation, which many companies see as less restrictive and more flexible than being monitored by a regulatory agency. And it will lay a basis for the United States in the negotiations leading up to a global climate treaty to be

signed in Copenhagen in December.

Once made final, the agency's finding will pave the way for federal regulation of carbon dioxide, methane and other heat-trapping gases linked to <u>global warming</u>.

In practical terms, the finding would allow quick federal regulation of motor vehicle emissions of heat-trapping gases and, if further actions are taken by the E.P.A., it could open the doors for regulatory controls on power plants, oil refineries, cement plants and other factories.

On Friday, the E.P.A. sent its finding to the <u>Office of Management and Budget</u> for review, according to a Web site that lists pending federal rules. Once the budget office clears the finding, it can be signed by the E.P.A.'s administrator, <u>Lisa P. Jackson</u>. There is also likely to be a public comment period on the proposed finding, but there is wide expectation that it will be put in place.

Some policy makers greeted the agency's action as the first step in a new approach to climate change.

"This finding will officially end the era of denial on global warming," Representative <u>Edward J.</u> <u>Markey</u>, a Massachusetts Democrat who leads a select committee on global warming, said in a statement.

But Bill Kovacs, a specialist on global warming issues with the United States Chamber of Commerce, said that an endangerment finding would automatically provoke a tangle of regulatory requirements for businesses large and small.

If finalized, the finding by the agency could lead to a vast extension of its reach. Much is unknown about the details of what the E.P.A. is proposing, including how stringently the agency would regulate the emissions and how it would go about doing so.

But in February, Ms. Jackson indicated she was aware the agency could be stepping into a minefield by issuing such a finding. "We are poised to be specific on what we regulate and on what schedule," she said at the time. "We don't want people to spin that into a doomsday scenario."

Experts said Monday that the E.P.A.'s action would put pressure on Congress to pass federal legislation that could supplant the agency's plan or guide how it was carried out. A federal bill is preferred by many environmentalists and policy makers, as well as by industry.

John D. Walke, a senior lawyer at the <u>Natural Resources Defense Council</u>, said he welcomed the agency's decision but hoped it would ultimately lead to federal legislation.

"For some period we may have parallel efforts of Environmental Protection Agency pursuing or even adopting regulation while the eventual main show will be in Congress," Mr. Walke said.

Still, many doubt that legislation to cap emissions can pass this year, in the midst of a recession

and at a time when carbon dioxide emissions are down because production is lower.

The E.P.A.'s move is the latest in a flurry of proposals that signal its determination to break from the Bush administration, which infuriated environmentalists by sidestepping the issue of regulating heat-trapping gases.

Earlier this month, the agency proposed creating a greenhouse-gas emissions registry, which would require industries — including oil refineries and cement makers, as well as utilities and pulp and paper manufacturers — to report how much pollution they were emitting.

The endangerment proposal is another step. In 2007, the <u>Supreme Court</u> ordered the E.P.A. to determine whether carbon dioxide and other heat-trapping gases qualified as pollutants under the <u>Clean Air Act</u>. Ms. Jackson, the agency's administrator, suggested to The New York Times in February that she hoped to act on emissions of heat-trapping gases by early April, before the second anniversary of the court's ruling.

The Bush administration had stalled in complying with the court order, opting for more study of the issue, although there was wide consensus among E.P.A. experts that a determination that carbon dioxide was a danger to the public was supported by scientific research.

Asked about the E.P.A.'s move, the White House press secretary, <u>Robert Gibbs</u>, emphasized the importance of going through Congress. "The way to deal with greenhouse gases," Mr. Gibbs said, "is to work with Congress in order to put together a plan that deals with this and creates a market for renewable energy."

There are several reasons that there is a widespread preference for a legislative "cap-and-trade" approach to regulating carbon dioxide emissions, as opposed to E.P.A. regulation.

A central reason, said Paul Bledsoe of the National Commission on Energy Policy, is that Congressional action is less subject to litigation and could not be easily overturned by a new administration.

But a deeper concern among the industry is that regulation by the E.P.A. is a blunt tool. The agency's regulatory powers have previously been applied mainly to pollutants that do damage on a regional level, like nitrogen oxide and hydrocarbons.

By contrast, carbon dioxide, methane and other heat-trapping gases that the E.P.A. proposes to regulate do harm on a global scale.

"The act does not deal well with an emission that's virtually ubiquitous and travels through the atmosphere," said Carol Raulston, a spokesman for the National Mining Association, a coal industry group.

AP source: EPA closer to global warming warning

WASHINGTON – The Environmental Protection Agency has taken the first step on the long road to regulating greenhouse gases under the Clean Air Act.

Politicians and the public, business and industry will have to weigh in along the way, but for now a proposed finding by the EPA that global warming is a threat to public health and welfare is under White House review.

The threat declaration would be the first step to regulating carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases under the Clean Air Act and could have broad economic and environmental ramifications. It also would probably spur action by Congress to address climate change more broadly.

The White House acknowledged Monday that the EPA had transmitted its proposed finding on global warming to the Office of Management and Budget, but provided no details. It also cautioned that the Obama administration, which sees responding to climate change a top priority, nevertheless is ready to move cautiously when it comes to actually regulating greenhouse gases, preferring to have Congress act on the matter.

The Supreme Court two years ago directed the EPA to decide whether greenhouse gases, especially carbon dioxide from burning fossil fuels, pose a threat to public health and welfare because they are warming the earth. If such a finding is made, these emissions are required to be regulated under the Clean Air Act, the court said.

"I think this is just the step in that process," said White House Press Secretary Robert Gibbs, noting the Supreme Court ruling. Another White House official, speaking anonymously in deference to Gibbs, predicted "a long process" before any rules would be expected to be issued on heat-trapping emissions.

But several congressional officials, also speaking on condition of anonymity because the draft declaration had not been made public — said the transmission makes clear the EPA is moving to declare carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases a danger to public health and welfare and views them as ripe for regulation under the Clean Air Act.

Such a finding "will officially end the era of denial on global warming," said Rep. Ed Markey, D-Mass., whose Energy and Commerce subcommittee is crafting global warming legislation. He said such an endangerment finding is long overdue because of the Bush administration's refusal

to address the issue.

The EPA action "signals that the days of ignoring this pressing issue are over," said Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., whose Senate committee is working on a climate bill.

Many business leaders argue — as did President George W. Bush — that the Clean Air Act is ill-suited to deal with climate change and that regulating carbon dioxide would hamstring economic growth.

"It will require a huge cascade of (new clean air) permits" and halt a wide array of projects, from building coal plants to highway construction, including many at the heart of President Barack Obama's economic recovery plan, said Bill Kovacs, a vice president for environmental and technology issues at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

Abigail Dillen, an attorney for the environmental advocacy group Earthjustice, which is involved in a number of lawsuits challenging permits for new coal plants, dismissed the dire economic warnings from business groups about carbon dioxide regulation.

"It's to their interest to say the sky is falling, but it's not," she said. "The truth is we've never had to sacrifice air quality to maintain a healthy economy. The EPA has discretion to do this in a reasonable way."

An internal EPA planning document that surfaced recently suggests the agency would like to have a final endangerment finding by mid-April. But officials have made clear actual regulations are unlikely to come immediately and would involve a lengthy process with public comment.

Gibbs, when asked about the EPA document Monday, emphasized that "the president has made quite clear" that he prefers to have the climate issue addressed by Congress as part of a broad, mandatory limit on heat-trapping emissions.

But environmentalists said the significance of moving forward with the long-delayed endangerment issue should not be understated.

"This is historic news," said Frank O'Donnell, who heads Clean Air Watch, an advocacy group. "It will set the stage for the first-ever national limits on global warming pollution and is likely to help light a fire under Congress to get moving."

EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson didn't even have the keys to her office when the Obama administration sta rted its ambitious revamp of her agency.

Immediately after swearing Jackson into her new post, President Barack Obama ordered her to review a Bush administration ruling that prohibited California and 15 other states from setting tougher auto emissions standards. Then, he ordered the Transportation Department to enforce tougher fuel efficiency standards by 2011.

The administration's message was clear: A new, greener day has dawned at the Environmental Protection Agency.

EPA was one of the most demoralized agencies in the federal government under President George W. Bush. The career staff — which supports stricter environmental regulation — bristled under political appointees who blocked agency initiatives. Their frustration was shared by many in the environmental community, including Jackson. As head of New Jersey's Department of Environmental Protection, she joked that in the Bush administration, EPA stood for the "Emissions Permissions Agency."

Now, Jackson is quickly moving forward on a host of once-stalled proposals. In the first 100 days, EPA has taken initial steps to impose stricter controls on coal plants, mercury produced by power plants and greenhouse gas emissions.

"Lisa Jackson took over a listing battleship, and she has righted it and turned it around," said Dan Weiss, director of climate strategy at the left-leaning Center for American Progress. "Probably no federal agency will have undergone such a profound change than EPA under Obama."

Gold Medal Performance

OAThe EPA took a major step toward capping greenhouse gas emissions when it issued a much-anticipated finding this month that global warming is a danger to human health and welfare. The finding will have a huge economic impact on coal plants, transportation and manufacturing. It also increases the pressure for Congress to pass climate change legislation before international climate talks in Copenhagen in December. If lawmakers fail to act, the ruling could force EPA to impose strict new regulations.

Worst Train Wreck

One early letdown came when Jon Cannon, a former top EPA lawyer, withdrew his nomination for deputy administrator. The move came after vetters began scrutinizing a now-defunct nonprofit group where Cannon once served on the board of directors that was faulted for mishandling federal grant money.

Sea Change

In a memo to EPA employees, Jackson laid out the administration's guiding principles: science, rule of law and transparency. And EPA is backed by an administration that counts global warming as one of its top priorities. "There is no example, much less a recent example, of this amount of high-level policy attention being devoted to global warming, clean energy and green jobs," says John Walke, clean air director for the Natural Resources Defense Council. "We're in uncharted territory."

Elephant in the Room

Observers say it will take a long time to undo some of the Bush administration actions that the new administration would like to reverse — such as the=2 Oeasing of prohibitions against dumping mine waste near streams and years of little action on regulating greenhouse gases.

Biggest Food Fight

EPA could soon find itself in a turf war with the Department of Transportation, since both are authorized to address auto emissions. Currently, EPA is reviewing whether to grant states a legal waiver to lower passenger car emissions by 30 percent, while DOT recently revised the federal corporate average fuel economy, or CAFE, standards. Depending on what EPA decides, the two agencies could release conflicting emissions standards: one for states that get the waiver and another that would be applied nationwide.,



President Obama said Wednesday that policymakers must not "ignore" global warming science, but he declined to provide a full-throated endorsement of upcoming Environmental Protection Agency greenhouse-gas rules.

Obama, speaking at a White House press conference the day after huge GOP electoral gains, called for bipartisan cooperation on energy policy while suggesting he's open to several ideas on climate now that cap-and-trade legislation is dead.

The comments come as many Republicans and some centrist Democrats are pushing to limit EPA's power to regulate emissions from power plants, refineries and other sources. EPA rules are slated to begin taking effect next year.

Obama acknowledged the sweeping cap-and-trade and energy bill that passed the House last year will stay on ice.

"I think there are a lot of Republicans that ran against the energy bill that passed in the House last year. And so it's doubtful that you could get the votes to pass that through the House this year or next year or the year after," he said.

But Obama said he sees opportunities for working across the aisle on boosting natural gas development, domestic production of electric cars, nuclear power – which he noted does not emit greenhouse gases – and energy efficiency.

"I don't think there's anybody in America who thinks that we've got an energy policy that works the way it needs to, that thinks that we shouldn't be working on energy independence," Obama said.

"And that gives opportunities for Democrats and Republicans to come together and think about – you know, whether it's natural gas or energy efficiency or how we can build electric cars in this country – how do we move forward on that agenda," he added.



Greens and public health advocates fear the White House is losing its backbone when it comes to defending its environmental policies - at the worst possible time.

The Environmental Protection Agency this week delayed two major clean air regulations aimed at curbing ozone and toxic air pollution from industrial boilers. The Obama administration denies that politics are in play, but that appearance is hard to avoid as House Republicans prepare to use their majority to try and rollback EPA standards.

The delays have garnered national attention, including a front page story of Friday's New York Times and sent shockwaves through the environmental and public health communities. Now, activists who heralded Obama's aggressive environmental policies are preparing to circle their wagons around other rules they say may be vulnerable.

"Given the events of this week, environmental regulators are on high alert for signs of future attempts to delay or interfere with the roll-out of important regulatory health protections," said Bill Becker, executive director of the National Association of Clean Air Agencies.

Next up are measures to slash soot, smog and mercury from power plants and a national air quality standard for fine particle pollution.

The delayed air rules "should be a clarion call to arms that we're going to need to step up or we're just going to get rolled," said Frank O'Donnell, president of the advocacy group Clean Air Watch.

Obama administration officials said the delays are based on technical issues, not politics.

"These announcements have nothing to do with each other or with the other rules we've announced in the past, or will announce in the future, to protect Americans' health," said EPA spokesman Brendan Gilfillan. "No one should read anything more into this than the fact that we're doing what we've said we'd do all along: following the best science and the law."

The agency wants to re-propose the boiler rule for legal reasons, he said, and has delayed the ozone rule to get additional input from science advisers.

But Eric Schaeffer, director of the nonprofit Environmental Integrity Project, said the administration is understandably wary after the midterm election. "They lost a ton of seats in the heartland. They took a beating," he said.

"Somewhere in the White House I'm sure they're thinking they need to trim back on some of this stuff, but I just don't think in Ohio people are wandering around thinking the ozone standards are too strict," added Schaeffer, EPA's enforcement chief under the George W. Bush administration until he resigned in 2002.

EPA regulations became an easy mark for lawmakers on both sides of the aisle this year, especially during the midterm elections. And top Republicans have fallen over themselves pledging to grill EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson to Capitol Hill over standards ranging from air toxics rules to greenhouse gas regulations.

Rep. Fred Upton (R-Mich.), the incoming chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, has pledged to use his new post to lead probes into a spate of EPA rulemakings he has dubbed "job-killing regulations." He listed several of his prime targets in a recent Washington Times op-ed, including the now-delayed ozone rule and air toxics standard for industrial boilers, a controversial coal ash rule and a cooling water intake rule for power plants.

White House spokesman Clark Stevens said the administration is ready for the fight.

"The administration is committed to building on and defending our efforts to transition to a clean energy economy and increase environmental protection," Stevens told POLITICO in a statement. "We will continue to take steps to develop science based, common sense regulations that protect the health of Americans while also focusing on creating jobs, reducing dependence on foreign oil, and cutting pollution."

Paul Billings, vice president of national policy and advocacy at the American Lung Association, said he hopes the delays are not an emerging pattern or a policy decision. "We need EPA to move forward with these rulemakings and the other rules that are in the queue because there are very real consequences for not doing so."

EPA estimates that the proposed ozone standard would help prevent up to 12,000 premature deaths and save up to \$100 billion dollars in health costs, while the air toxics rule for boilers could prevent 5,000 premature deaths and yield up to \$44 billion in health benefits per year.

If EPA weakens or delays a draft air toxics rule for power plants due out in March, "it will be a huge breaking point," Becker said. "If ever a case can be made for additional regulation, it's forcing dirty power plants to take mercury and other poisons out of coal in order to protect children and pregnant women."

Considering the pressure EPA will face from Capitol Hill, some say the extra time could actually help the agency.

"EPA is clearly in for a sustained period of aggressive and even hostile oversight," said Jason Grumet, President of the Bipartisan Policy Center. "It will save the agency time in the long run to ensure that its analysis, explanation and outreach are buttoned up tight."

In an effort to redo many of the Bush administration's policies - including the ozone and boilers regulations, the Obama EPA has "rushed through some major, major rules," said Jeff Holmstead, an industry attorney who served as EPA air chief during the George W. Bush administration. "Not only the air quality standards, but things that ordinarily just kind of cook a much longer time."

This was the third time the Obama administration delayed its final revision of the George W. Bush EPA's

ozone standard. Sen. Tom Carper (D-Del.) said he hopes it will be "the last delay we will see on this issue."

STATEMENT OF ADMINISTRATION POLICY

H.R. 910 - Energy Tax Prevention Act of 2011

(Rep. Upton, R-MI, and 95 cosponsors)

The Administration strongly opposes House passage of H.R. 910, which would halt the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) common-sense steps under the Clean Air Act (CAA) to protect Americans from harmful air pollution. H.R. 910 would also increase the Nation's dependence on oil and other fossil fuels as well as contradict the scientific consensus on climate change.

The CAA gives EPA the necessary tools to protect our families from a wide variety of harmful pollutants that cause asthma and lung disease – especially in children. Weakening these standards would allow more pollution in the air we breathe and threaten the health of Americans across the country. A recent report by EPA shows how important this landmark law has been in protecting public health. In 2010 alone, just one part of the CAA prevented:

- · 160,000 premature deaths;
- · 130,000 heart attacks;
- More than 100,000 hospital visits by preventing millions of cases of

respiratory problems, including bronchitis and asthma. It enhanced productivity by preventing millions of lost workdays, and kept kids healthy and in school, avoiding millions of lost school days due to respiratory illness and other diseases caused or exacerbated by air pollution.

Since 1970, the CAA has reduced key air pollutants that cause smog and particulate pollution by more than 60 percent. At the same time the economy has more than tripled. And since the CAA Amendments in 1990, electricity production is up and prices are stable. In 2009, electric utilities delivered 33 percent more electricity to U.S. households and businesses than in 1990, while nationwide electricity prices remained essentially unchanged.

Over its 40-year span, the benefits of the CAA – in the form of longer lives, healthier kids, greater workforce productivity, and ecosystem protections – outweigh the costs by more than 30 to one.

Passage of H.R. 910 would also block important policy measures that enable the CAA to achieve additional societal benefits related to carbon pollution. For example, the bill would block EPA's involvement in the historic, bipartisan Federal program to promote vehicle fuel economy standards for Model Years 2017-2025. This program will reduce oil consumption, provide significant savings to American consumers at the pump, and limit pollution from tailpipe emissions. Further, H.R. 910 would second guess the widely-accepted scientific consensus that carbon pollution is at increasingly dangerous concentrations and is contributing to the threat of climate change. This could create uncertainty around the requirements which are currently in effect for the Model Year 2012-2016 vehicle standards. Finally, H.R. 910 would contradict public health experts and scientists and strip EPA of its authority to develop sensible standards for currently unchecked carbon pollution, and thus prevent EPA from following its statutory obligations as interpreted by the Supreme Court.

If the President is presented with this legislation, which would seriously roll back the CAA authority, harm Americans' health by taking away our ability to decrease carbon pollution, and undercut fuel efficiency standards that will save Americans money at the pump while decreasing our dependence on oil, his senior advisors would recommend that he veto the bill.

The Obama Hiatus

The Administration takes a two-year holiday from its own agenda.

President Obama's re-election machine is already running full bore, but has his entire Administration also decamped for the campaign trail? We ask because the towering ambitions of Mr. Obama's first two years have suddenly gone into abeyance in his third, apparently to be deferred until years five through eight. The White House is more or less conceding that it doesn't have a chance of winning a second term unless his major policies go on hiatus.

This holiday from committing liberal history began in December with the White House-GOP deal that extended the Bush tax rates through the 2012 election and added a payroll tax cut on employees to 4.2% from 6.2%. These proposals came from the same Democrats who only months earlier had increased payroll taxes to finance their health-care bill and routinely claim that tax rates don't matter to the private economy. But then, 9.1% joblessness and 1.8% growth have a way of concentrating the political mind.

Next came the much-ballyhooed White House scrub for "excessive" regulation, even as hundreds of new rules mandated by the legislation of the first two years continue to be written and to slow business investment. But at least the rule review persuaded the Environmental Protection Agency to stop treating dairy farm milk spills as if they were Gulf oil leaks. That should help next year in Wisconsin.

Picking up the vacation pace, this week the EPA delayed by two months the carbon regulations that it wants to impose, even as it resists bipartisan attempts on Capitol Hill to kill them altogether. Next up may be a delay in pending regulations meant to harm coal-fired power, before opponents gather enough votes to kill them. The EPA has already yanked an entire rule that would have forced thousands of businesses to install new industrial boilers.

Maybe the White House should short-circuit all this by dispatching EPA administrator Lisa Jackson to an undisclosed location through November 2012.

Also this week, The Commodity Futures Trading Commission voted—five to zero—to delay by six months the derivatives swap rules that were due this month under the Dodd-Frank financial re-regulation. The alphabet soup of financial regulators will eventually add tens of thousands of pages to the Federal Register, but for now they are conceding that the derivatives market isn't the calamity they claimed it was in the rush to pass the bill.

Then there's health care. Over the last year, the Health and Human Services Department has granted at least 1,372 temporary waivers to ObamaCare mandates, most notably for price controls on private insurance companies. Many have gone to Democratic allies like unions, but many more went to ordinary businesses and even states. HHS has already given a pass to Nevada, New Hampshire and Maine, and another dozen or so have applied or are expected to ask for exemptions.

This is less political favoritism than a panicked, ad hoc bid to minimize pre-election insurance disruptions that can be attributed to a law that is still widely reviled. If the law isn't enforced, maybe voters will forget it passed. In its New Hampshire reprieve, HHS admitted that ObamaCare would "destabilize the individual market," though it neglected to mention that this is what ObamaCare is meant to do. Just not yet.

By the way, this waiver process isn't in the law's statutory language. HHS has simply created it via regulation. In other words, the health bureaucracy knew the rules they were writing would be destructive and have created a political safety valve. They have even found a way to override ObamaCare's cuts to the Medicare Advantage program that were counted as "savings" to make the health bill look less spendthrift. Medicare Advantage offers insurance choices to one in four seniors and is popular in, well, Florida, so seniors also get a two-year reprieve.

Why aren't liberals deploring this betrayal of their programs? Perhaps because even they can't ignore reality forever. Mr. Obama's epic fiscal binge, waves of new industrial policy and the political allocation of credit haven't created the boom they promised. If business can now be persuaded that the government assault is over and start to invest again so the economy improves enough for Mr. Obama to win a second term, then a two-year delay in fulfilling their dreams is well worth it.

Liberals figure that as long as Mr. Obama can be re-elected next year on another hope-and-change platform, it will be too late to hope to change anything and he can then return to his legacy project of building a tax and entitlement state on the European model. The economy may benefit from Mr. Obama's temporary amnesty, but the real lesson of this hiatus from liberalism is that it should be shut down permanently.

The government's latest plan for managing 4.2 million acres of remaining roadless national-forest land in Colorado offers the strictest protection for only about 13 percent of it and makes exceptions for mining, logging and ski-area expansion.

Now, in a broad critique of that plan, the Environmental Protection Agency is seeking a much stronger approach.

EPA officials have submitted a letter asking the Forest Service to ensure top-tier protection for 2.6 million acres, more than quadruple the current 562,200 acres. The EPA also is recommending measures to reduce greenhouse-gas emissions from coal mining and to prevent harm to wetlands from development around ski areas.

Colorado natural resources officials, who helped develop the federal plan, declined to address EPA concerns.

"We look forward to reviewing the perspective of the EPA as we work through and consider its views as well as those from many organizations, industries and individuals who have taken the time to examine the proposed rule and submit comments," state natural resources spokesman Todd Hartman said.

The EPA critique adds to concerns raised by industry and environmental advocacy groups. Energy companies opposed provisions that could limit drilling. Preservationists worry that exceptions allowing tree-cutting as deep as 1.5 miles into roadless forests, to prevent wildfires in beetle-ravaged areas near towns, will lead to needless harm.

"We cannot force them to make these changes," EPA environmental scientist Elaine Suriano said at the agency's headquarters in Washington. "These are things we think are important. Generally, agencies pay attention to what other agencies have to say."

Forest Service officials said they'll consider EPA concerns along with those of 55,000 others who submitted comments on the plan. Comments have been collected at federal offices in California.

"The EPA has got a role in the enforcement of the Clean Air Act and enforcement of the Clean Water Act and, to the extent these comments address those kinds of resources, we will take a close look at it," said Randy Karsteadt, acting deputy regional forester in Denver.

By early 2012, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack is expected to issue a final statement of how the plan for managing roadless forests in Colorado probably would affect the environment – and announce a final rule to implement the plan.

The current national rule governing use of roadless national-forest land, established under President Bill Clinton , blocks most road building on 4.4 million of the 14.5 million acres of national forest in Colorado.

EPA officials said in a letter and seven-page summary submitted Monday that increased upper-tier acreage in Colorado "would provide greater protection of roadless characteristics and less opportunity for adverse impacts to air quality and aquatic resources."


They recommended burning or capturing methane gas released from coal-mine vents — for which companies need temporary roads for drilling and maintenance. The exceptions granted for ski-area expansion into roadless forests could lead to new lodging, parking lots and other development affecting surrounding forests, EPA officials said. This requires "discussion of how these impacts would be mitigated to protect forest resources." Environmental advocates welcomed the EPA scrutiny.

"This shows where the Forest Service hasn't done its job" and may require changing the proposal, Earthjustice staff attorney Ted Zukoski said.

The large number of parties submitting comments indicates Coloradans "want an improved rule - a rule that really protects the values of roadless areas," said Rocky Smith, forest project director for Rocky Mountain Wild. "This rule, even though it's better than some previous versions, doesn't do a very good job."

In accordance with our responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), 42 U.S.C. Section 4321, *et seq.*, and Section 309 of the Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. Section 7609, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has reviewed the U.S Forest Service's (USFS) Revised Draft Environmental Impact Statement (RDEIS) for the proposed Colorado Roadless Rule.

This RDEIS was prepared to disclose and analyze potential environmental impacts associated with four alternatives of a state-specific rule to manage roadless area values and characteristics on USFS lands in Colorado. The Preferred Alternative (Alternative 2 – Colorado Roadless Rule), encompasses 4.19 million acres using updated evaluations to identify Colorado Roadless Area (CRA) boundaries. Management provisions include additional exceptions for tree-cutting/sale/removal and temporary road construction/reconstruction; however, 562,200 acres are identified as CRA upper tier acres where road construction and tree-cutting activities would be tightly restricted. In addition, 20,000 CRA acres are identified as the North Fork coal mining area where temporary road construction/reconstruction exceptions would apply. This alternative includes additional provisions to consider in determining conditions for inclusion in approved Surface Use Plans of Operation for proposed oil and gas leasing in CRAs.

We commend the USFS for its cooperative effort with the State of Colorado to develop a rule that provides state-specific management direction for over four million acres of roadless area in Colorado while being responsive to public comments. With a few exceptions, the RDEIS provides thorough disclosure and analysis of impacts. As a result, our primary concerns and recommendations are as follows: inclusion of limited upper tier acreage, air quality, greenhouse gas emissions associated with future coal development, aquatic resources, and environmental justice.

OFFICE OF ENFORCEMENT AND COMPLIANCE ASSURANCE The proposed Colorado Roadless Rule's "upper tier" concept would provide greater protection from impacts related to road construction/reconstruction and tree-cutting/sale/removal on upper tier acreage as compared to other CRA acres. Under the Preferred Alternative (Alternative 2 – Colorado Roadless Rule), 562,200 acres would be identified as CRA upper tier acres in six of the eight covered National Forests. Under Alternative 4 (Colorado Roadless Rule with Public Proposed Upper Tier Acres), 2,614,200 acres would be identified as upper tier acres, with all eight of the covered National Forests including some upper tier designation. The substantial additional upper tier acreage of Alternative 4 would provide greater protection of roadless characteristics and less opportunity for adverse impacts to air quality and aquatic resources. Therefore, we recommend expanding the Preferred Alternative to include additional upper tier acreage.

Numerous population centers and mandatory Class I Federal areas are located near proposed CRAs where potential air emissions may be of concern. While the RDEIS provides data regarding existing visibility trends for the mandatory Class I Federal areas of the region, the remainder of the analysis area includes only a qualitative discussion of ambient air quality. Given EPA's concerns regarding air quality, we recommend that the USFS provide additional baseline data of air quality conditions in the remainder of the analysis area.

The Preferred Alternative designates the North Fork coal mining area with 19,625 acres available for leasing (of which only 4,025 acres are currently leased) and potentially 360 million tons of recoverable coal. The RDEIS includes only a qualitative discussion of GHG emissions associated with development and use of these coal resources. To consider the range of impacts resulting from each alternative's potential GHG emissions and climate change impacts, we recommend the USFS quantify and disclose projected annual and total lifetime cumulative GHG emissions, including emissions from combustion of the mined coal, resulting from potential future coal development.

Most activities resulting from the various alternatives, including road construction/reconstruction, treecutting/sale/removal, linear construction zones (LCZ's), and ski resort expansion, have the potential to adversely impact aquatic resources, including wetlands, streams, riparian areas, and their supporting hydrology. We recommend the Final EIS (FEIS) include a thorough characterization of existing aquatic resources and baseline conditions; including quality, quantity and location of surface waters, wetlands, streams and ephemeral drainages, and the impacts each alternative would have on these baseline conditions.

While the RDEIS provides a substantial amount of data regarding Colorado demographics, there is limited discussion of potential impacts to environmental justice communities associated with the various alternatives. We recommend the FEIS include the process the USFS used to identify low income and minority communities as well as the potential direct, indirect and cumulative environmental impacts of roadless activities on these communities.

Based on our review, we have rated the RDEIS as "Environmental Concerns – Insufficient Information (EC-2)". As explained in this letter and the attached detailed comments, we have a number of concerns regarding potential impacts of the Preferred Alternative, as well as the level of analysis and information provided concerning those impacts. We look forward to continuing to work with you during the development of the FEIS to address these concerns. U.S Environmental Protection Agency Detailed Comments – Colorado Roadless Rule RDEIS

Air quality

The RDEIS acknowledges there are no portions of the proposed roadless areas designated as nonattainment for particulate matter and that all airsheds overlapping roadless areas in Colorado meet air quality standards. However, given EPA's concerns regarding air quality, we recommend the Final EIS (FEIS) include the following additional baseline data of air quality conditions in the remainder of the analysis area:

- Identification of sensitive receptors (such as population centers and Class I and Sensitive Class II areas in the vicinity), as well as lakes and streams sensitive to acid deposition effects;
- Airshed classifications and baseline conditions for all NAAQS at nearby population centers; and
- Disclosure of any regional concerns (e.g., PM₁₀, PM_{2.5} and ozone issues in the area).

Such data are readily available from the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) and/or the EPA AirExplorer web site (<u>http://www.epa.gov/airexplorer/</u>). Decision-makers will need to understand baseline conditions in an effort to ensure that future projects, when combined with air quality impacts from external sources, do not adversely impact the NAAQS.

<u>Emissions Inventory</u>: We are concerned that no emissions inventory is provided for predicted emissions that may result under the various alternatives. Tree-cutting/removal, prescribed fire, road construction/reconstruction, and coal mining activities affect air quality. The RDEIS notes that tree-cutting, sale or removal activities and fuel management activities in the analysis area would vary (increasingly more activities possible by Alternative 1, 4, 2, and 3, respectively) and would affect from 2,300 to 16,900 acres. It is unclear what percentage of these acreage estimates would include prescribed fire treatments. Since total mileage estimates for all activities do not appear to be included in the RDEIS, we recommend that estimated acreage or mileage for each potential activity and the associated emissions, by alternative, be provided in the FEIS.

<u>Prescribed Fire:</u> The RDEIS has a very limited discussion of prescribed fire except to acknowledge that it is often applied in conjunction with tree-cutting. The RDEIS should clarify whether additional tree-cutting and road construction will result in significantly more use of prescribed fire over increased acreage as stipulated in Alternatives 1, 4, 2, and 3, respectively.

Increased use of prescribed fire may cause degradation of air quality in the region. We appreciate that the RDEIS notes the USFS would consult with CDPHE through permitting processes prior to conducting prescribed burns. While we realize the individual burn plans would quantify expected emissions, we recommend that a best estimate of the prescribed fire acreage and potential emissions be disclosed in the FEIS. Such information is necessary to fully inform the public as well as the decision-maker to ensure protection of air quality if the prescribed burns are ultimately conducted.

We also recommend the FEIS provide more detail regarding: (1) requirements for the incorporation of the Interagency Prescribed Fire Planning and Implementation Procedures Guide (July 2008) into the site-specific burn plans designed for each prescribed burn conducted as a result of the various tree-cutting exceptions; (2) appropriate smoke monitoring techniques and mitigation (including meteorological conditions favorable for mitigating prescribed fire smoke and alternatives to prescribed

fire such as mechanical fuel reduction methods); and (3) how the public will be notified of pending burns.

<u>Harvest-Related, Transportation-Related, and Dust-Related Emissions:</u> Air quality in IRAs/CRAs also would be negatively impacted by emissions from heavy diesel equipment utilized for tree-cutting, idling trucks used for transportation of wood products, and dust generated from associated activities. EPA is concerned that the RDEIS does not contain an inventory of predicted emissions that would be associated with tree-cutting and associated activities that could potentially occur under each alternative. We recommend that the FEIS include such an emissions inventory.

Further, these emissions could be addressed through project-level design criteria and monitoring. Example measures that could be recommended through the state-specific rule include the following:

- Prohibit unnecessary idling of transportation trucks;
- Use low-sulfur or alternative fuels;
- Require heavy diesel equipment to use cleanest available engines or retrofits with diesel particulate control technology;
- Maintain engines;
- Require dust abatement measures and detailed plans for dust control;
- Require prompt revegetation of decommissioned roads and monitor for five years after revegetation to ensure success; and
- Monitor decommissioned roads for effectiveness of closure.

<u>Indirect and Cumulative Impacts:</u> Under Alternatives 2 and 4 (Colorado Roadless Rule), 1,710 acres included in IRAs were not included within CRA boundaries. The 2001 Roadless Rule did not offer the potential for expanded development of areas adjacent to permitted ski areas and allocated for ski area management in forest plans. The FEIS should clearly present the magnitude of air emissions that may result if IRA/CRA acreage would allow for ski resort residential/commercial expansion. These include associated indirect impacts to air quality resulting from onsite power sources, potential use of fireplaces and woodburning stoves, and increased traffic congestion are of particular interest. Potential mitigation measures, such as providing shuttle services and requiring gas fireplaces, may be of value to planning considerations at this early stage of the process.

We recommend that the FEIS include a discussion of likely vehicle miles traveled associated with projected increases in residential and visitor capacity, as well as the related mobile source emissions inventory. We recommend estimating mobile source emissions with EPA's MOVES2010a mobile sources emission model and re-entrained road dust emissions with use of EPA's Compilation of Air Pollutant Emission Factors (AP-42). If total emissions are substantial, then an air impact analysis presenting direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts on sensitive receptors is reasonable.

In addition, we suggest the FEIS present indirect impacts from use of harvested and/or thinned trees for fuel. For instance, if any of the harvested timber would be used as feedstock for supplying fuel at a facility that provides heat and/or power, or would be converted to wood pellets or biofuels, then we suggest a discussion of specific uses and related air quality impacts, including greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. There may be mitigation options available to address these indirect emissions.

<u>Additional Provisions Related to Oil and Gas Leasing:</u> We are pleased that recent Instruction Memorandums on Oil and Gas Leasing will apply special provisions requiring environmental analyses for oil and gas leasing and in the approved Surface Use Plans of Operation. In addition, we recommend the RDEIS acknowledge the recently signed June 23, 2011, U.S. Department of the Interior and U.S. EPA Memorandum of Understanding and its applicability to future oil and gas leasing projects in the CRA's¹.

GHG emissions

Currently, all existing coal leases in IRAs/CRAs are located in the Grand Mesa-Uncompahgre-Gunnison National Forest (GMUG). Potential for future coal development varies by alternative, and EPA's comments are directed at the differences in potential future development. Alternative 1 (2001 Roadless Rule) would effectively prohibit future leases due to prohibition of road construction; Alternatives 2 and 4 (Colorado Roadless Rule) would allow road construction for future leases in the 20,000 acre North Fork coal mining area of the GMUG; and Alternative 3 (No Action) would allow road construction for future leases in the entire analysis area. The potential acres of accessible coal resources vary greatly by alternative, resulting in a wide range of estimated accessible recoverable tons of coal in roadless areas. The RDEIS provides roadless area estimates for acres of accessible coal resources and tons of accessible recoverable coal resources, respectively, as follows:

- Alternative 1 5,900 acres available (all currently leased) with potentially 108 million tons of
 recoverable coal;
- Alternatives 2 and 4 (North Fork coal mining area) 19,625 acres available (only 4,025 acres currently leased) with potentially 360 million tons of recoverable coal; and
- Alternative 3 36,900 acres available (only 5,900 acres currently leased) with potentially 675 million tons of recoverable coal.

The RDEIS includes only a qualitative discussion of GHG emissions associated with development and use of coal resources. In addition, it is unclear whether there is the potential for unmitigated methane emissions associated with future development in the North Fork coal mining area. To fully inform decision-makers and the public regarding the range of impacts resulting from each alternative's potential future coal development and associated GHG emissions and climate change impacts, we recommend analysis and disclosure of GHG emissions including:

- 1. Quantify and disclose in CO₂-equivalent terms the projected annual and total lifetime cumulative GHG emissions, including emissions from combustion of the mined coal, resulting from future coal development (see, <u>https://www.epa.gov/RDEE/energy-resources/calculator.html</u>).
- 2. Qualitatively discuss the link between GHGs and climate change, and the potential impacts of climate change. Estimating the level of GHG emissions from the potential future coal development associated with each of the alternatives can serve as a reasonable proxy for assessing potential climate change impacts, and provide decision makers and the public with useful information for a reasoned choice among alternatives.
- 3. Describe any relevant Regional, Tribal or State climate change plans or goals, as well as the extent to which USFS would reconcile, through mitigation or otherwise, its proposed action with such plans. For example, please consider the Colorado Climate Action Plan
- (<u>http://www.cdphe.state.co.us/climate/ClimateActionPlan.pdf</u>), the Western Climate Initiative (<u>http://www.westernclimateinitiative.org</u>), the Governor's Blue Ribbon Advisory Council on Climate Change 2007 Final Report (<u>http://www.deq.utah.gov/BRAC_Climate/final_report.htm</u>),

and Utah's GHG reduction goals to reduce GHG emissions to 2005 levels by 2020 (http://www.deq.utah.gov/Climate_Change/GHG.goal.htm).

4. Analyze in detail the potential means to mitigate GHG emissions and disclose potential GHG reductions associated with sure measures. EPA recommends the Final Colorado Roadless Rule require implementation of reasonable mitigations measures that would reduce or eliminate project-related GHG emissions from future coal development. In addition, we recommend adding a summary discussion of ongoing and projected regional climate change impacts relevant to the action area based on U.S. Global Change Research Program assessments and that the FEIS identify any potential need to adapt the proposed action to these effects, as well as any potential impacts from the proposed action that may be exacerbated by climate change.

Aquatic resources

We are concerned that there would be 406 fewer miles of streams protected under CRAs versus IRAs. We appreciated the RDEIS discussion related to aquatic resources; however, we recommend that USFS expand the discussion by including the following in the FEIS:

- A thorough characterization of existing aquatic resources and baseline conditions, including quality, quantity and location of surface waters, wetlands, streams and ephemeral drainages.
- Disclosure of impacts on these baseline conditions, including effects of development associated with potential ski resort expansion, that would result from activities associated with each alternative. Such impacts may include changes in surface and groundwater hydrology.
- A map and summary of all wetlands types and acreage in the analysis area and estimated wetlands acreage that would be impacted by each alternative.
- A description of any wetlands impacts, temporary and permanent, direct and indirect, past and foreseeable. Such impacts may include functional conversion of wetlands (e.g., forested to shrub-scrub); changes to supporting wetland hydrology (e.g., snow melt patterns, sheet flow, and groundwater hydrology); and wetland disturbance from grading and dredge and fill activities.

<u>Water Quality Data:</u> Baseline water quality data are critical particularly given proximity to the headwaters of four important rivers - the Colorado, Platte, Arkansas, and Rio Grande. To provide a baseline for future monitoring of impacts, we recommend the FEIS provide the following:

- A summary of the best available monitoring data on water quality and stream health for the analysis area, including *Escherichia coli*, nutrient concentrations, water temperatures, and turbidity data, if they exist.
- Identification of any significant gaps in data that could affect the decision and/or that may be targeted for collection under future project monitoring plans.

Impaired Waterbodies: We appreciate the RDEIS discussion related to Clean Water Act (CWA) Section 303(d) impaired or threatened waterbody segments in the analysis area. We recommend that the FEIS describe how the alternatives and resulting development might affect these waterbodies, particularly the water quality parameters causing the CWA Section 303(d) listing. Proposed activities in the drainages of CWA impaired or threatened streams must be consistent with the State's Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) developed for the listed waterbody. We recommend that mitigation or restoration activities be included to reduce existing sources of pollution to offset or compensate for pollutants generated under the various alternatives. In addition, we recommend that Table 3-25 be expanded to provide specifics on the TMDLs and applicable impaired stream segments.

<u>Wetlands</u>: Impacts to types and functions of wetlands in mountain environments are difficult or impossible to mitigate due to shorter growing seasons and low night time temperatures. To ensure that wetlands are protected to the greatest extent possible, it may be necessary to use Best Management Practices (BMPs) to protect sensitive soils, wetlands, riparian areas, meadows, stream crossings, and critical habitat.

We recommend that the FEIS describe how the USFS will show compliance with Executive Order 11990, Protection of Wetlands, including how wetlands will be identified, avoided, or ultimately mitigated at the project-specific level. We recommend a thorough discussion of impacts to wetlands and riparian habitat that may result from ski area development that would result from removal of IRA/CRA designation for those relevant acres.

To ensure that wetlands are protected to the greatest extent possible, it may be necessary to consider exclusion of tree-cutting, road construction, and LCZs in areas where wetlands would be adversely impacted. We support establishment of riparian habitat buffer zones to avoid adverse impacts to streams and riparian areas. Avoidance of tree-cutting, road construction, and LCZs in riparian areas may be necessary, as well as special protections for high quality wetland resources such as fens on the GMUG and San Juan National Forests, where these unique features are more common.

<u>Wastewater Associated with Energy Development:</u> We appreciate the RDEIS discussion of potential wastewater discharges associated with oil and gas operations, and recommend inclusion of similar information related to coal preparation plants. In addition, while we realize that the project-level NEPA analyses for the existing oil, gas, and coal leases most likely addressed specific details of wastewater discharges and waste rock storage, we recommend the roadless rule RDEIS discussion include a summary to better disclose baseline conditions. Such a summary might include the following:

- Estimate of water quantity used and its source;
- Percentage of wastewater disposed by surface discharge versus underground injection;
- Use of other possible disposal methods such as evaporation ponds;
- Location of waste rock piles and disposal procedures; and
- Identification of BMPs to prevent surface water and groundwater contamination.

<u>Design Criteria and Mitigation</u>: We support the list of design criteria for temporary road construction under Alternatives 2 and 4. We recommend expanding this list to address other potential concerns with temporary roads as well as potential concerns related to tree-cutting/fuels treatments, as follows:

- Require revegetation of all disturbed areas with native seed mix within the same growing season they are disturbed, and monitor revegetation efforts for five years to ensure success.
- Specify steps to protect range improvements (e.g., fences, water developments) from mechanical equipment used for tree-cutting/removal and prescribed burning.
- Monitor breakdown of hydrophobic soils for five years following prescribed burns.
- Develop a monitoring plan and schedule to assess the effectiveness of road decommissioning.

In addition, the use of LCZs for water conveyance systems, electrical and telecommunication transmission lines, and oil and gas pipeline varies depending on the alternative. It may be appropriate to identify requirements for project-level analyses, including disclosure of the following:

- Location and amount of disturbance proposed in wetlands (if applicable);
- Amount of wetland soil compaction expected from installation equipment;

- Location on which soil from trenching would be temporarily stored;
- Type and diameter of pipe to be installed;
- Width and depth of the necessary trenches, including locations of cutoff collars to prevent drainage along the pipes; and
- Identification of trench fill material that would be used to promote drainage (e.g., gravel).

If avoidance of wetland and riparian areas is not possible, we recommend identification of mitigation measures that would minimize the extent of wetlands impacts from these activities. Such measures include the following:

- Re-vegetate with removed shrubs and mats of herbaceous cover (carefully stockpiled on-site) and appropriate native wetland seed species as soon as possible after the disturbance. Monitor for five years to ensure successful re-vegetation of impacted montane wetland communities.
- Use bulkheads/box structures to minimize disturbance area from side casting and trench width.
- Use fabric or hay layers to protect existing vegetation from stockpiled dredged material and to mark existing contours.

<u>Indirect and Cumulative Impacts of Potential Ski Area Expansions:</u> EPA recommends the FEIS include information regarding the impacts from potential ski area development/expansion on ski area acres excluded from CRA boundaries. It appears that such development could substantially increase ski season and non-ski season use of the ski areas and surrounding forests. We recommend a discussion of the potential new residential and lodging units and foreseeable road and parking lot construction. In addition, we recommend inclusion of indirect impacts such as hydrologic changes and water quality impacts from erosion and contaminants caused by runoff from increased impervious surface area.

Planned and potential developments may result in the following indirect impacts to aquatic resources:

- Wetlands and riparian area impacts from up-gradient or adjacent development, grading, roads, ski terrain expansion, potential ski area facility improvements, increased year-round visitation, increased demand for hiking/biking trails and picnic facilities, and changes to hydrology;
- Water quality impacts from wastewater disposal, sediment and lawn chemicals; and
- Water quantity impacts from domestic and commercial water use, changes in stormwater runoff from new impervious surfaces, and down-cutting of streams.

We recommend discussion of how these impacts would be mitigated to protect forest resources and how implementation of such measures would be ensured at the project level.

Environmental justice

To ensure a robust analysis, we encourage the USFS to consult the Council on Environmental Quality's new posting of resources on NEPA and environmental justice at http://ceq.hss.doe.gov/nepa information/agency resources.html.

There may be water quality and/or air quality impacts of particular concern to local residents; therefore, EPA recommends the following:

• Disclosure of whether and where environmental justice communities are located in the analysis area, including a description of the methodology and criteria utilized to identify low income and

minority communities, the sources of data used for these analyses, and references for establishing the criteria.

- To the extent such communities are identified, a discussion of the potential direct, indirect and cumulative environmental impacts of roadless activities on these communities.
- An evaluation of the socio-economic impacts to the local communities, including any additional loading that would be placed on local communities' abilities to provide necessary public services and amenities associated with development resulting from changes in roadless area boundaries, the various exceptions to road construction and tree-cutting activities, and/or future coal mining development and ski area expansion. Such impacts may include better or worse access for subsistence hunting and gathering of fuel wood; increased housing development to meet the needs of project workers and families; burdening water, waste and wastewater handling facilities; and increased road traffic with associated dust and hazardous material spill potential. We recommend that methods to avoid or minimize such impacts be discussed in the FEIS.



WASHINGTON – The <u>Environmental Protection Agency</u> is emerging as a favorite target of the Republican presidential candidates, who portray it as the very symbol of a heavy-handed regulatory agenda imposed by the Obama administration that they say is strangling the economy.

Representative <u>Michele Bachmann</u> of Minnesota wants to padlock the E.P.A.'s doors, as does former Speaker Newt Gingrich. Gov. <u>Rick Perry</u> of Texas wants to impose an immediate moratorium on environmental regulation.

Representative <u>Ron Paul</u> of Texas wants environmental disputes settled by the states or the courts. Herman Cain, a businessman, wants to put many environmental regulations in the hands of an independent commission that includes <u>oil</u> and gas executives. Jon M. Huntsman Jr., the former Utah governor, thinks most new environmental regulations should be shelved until the economy improves.

Only Mitt Romney, the former Massachusetts governor, has a kind word for the E.P.A., and that is

qualified by his opposition to proposed regulation of carbon dioxide and other gases that contribute to global warming.

Opposition to regulation and skepticism about climate change have become tenets of Republican orthodoxy, but they are embraced with extraordinary intensity this year because of the faltering economy, high fuel prices, the <u>Tea Party</u> passion for smaller government and an activist Republican base that insists on strict adherence to the party's central agenda.

But while attacks on the E.P.A., climate-change science and environmental regulation more broadly are surefire applause lines with many Republican primary audiences, these views may prove a liability in the general election, pollsters and analysts say. The American people, by substantial majorities, are concerned about air and water pollution, and largely trust the E.P.A., national surveys say.

"Not only are these positions irresponsible, they're politically problematic," said David Jenkins of <u>Republicans for Environmental Protection</u>, a group that believes that conservation should be a core value of the party. "The whole idea that you have to bash the E.P.A. and run away from climate change to win a Republican primary has never been borne out. Where's the evidence?"

But the leading Republican candidates are all linking environmental regulation to jobs and the economy, suggesting that the nation cannot afford measures that impose greater costs on businesses and consumers. Mrs. Bachmann drew loud applause 10 days ago at a <u>rally in lowa</u> when she declared: "I guarantee you the E.P.A. will have doors locked and lights turned off, and they will only be about conservation. It will be a new day and a new sheriff in Washington, D.C."

In an earlier debate she said the agency should be renamed the "job-killing organization of America." She has called global-warming science a hoax.

The White House disputes the accusation that it is burdening the economy with regulations. It says that it issued fewer new rules in its first two years than the George W. Bush administration issued in its final two years.

"This administration has shown a clear commitment to taking steps to protect our families from dangerous pollution, while at the same time ensuring those steps are implemented in a way that minimizes costs, maximizes flexibility and does not impede our economic recovery," said Clark Stevens, a White House spokesman.

Mr. Perry has been at war with the E.P.A. almost since the day he took office as governor. He is leading a group of states in a <u>lawsuit</u> seeking to block the agency from putting in place rules limiting greenhouse gas emissions from power plants, refineries and other large sources.

On Monday, Mr. Perry called on Mr. Obama to <u>halt all regulations</u> because, Mr. Perry said, "his E.P.A. regulations are killing jobs all across America."

In his book, <u>"Fed Up, Our Fight to Save America from Washington,</u>" Mr. Perry described global-warming science as "one contrived phony mess that is falling apart under its own weight" and a "secular carbon cult" led by false prophets like AI Gore.

Such regulatory and financial sentiments are shared by many Republicans in Congress and are encouraged by industries that are reliable financial supporters of Republican candidates – the petroleum industry, utilities, <u>coal</u> companies, heavy manufacturers and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. Republican presidential candidates cross these interests at their peril.

"It remains to be seen of course, but my guess is that in order to get the nomination you're going to have to be pretty solid on these issues," said Myron Ebell, of the <u>Competitive Enterprise Institute</u>, a libertarian research and advocacy organization in Washington. "It's going to be a litmus test or shorthand way for voters to see how the candidate thinks about not only big issues like global warming and energy rationing policies, but it's indicative of other things as well."

Mr. Ebell said that Mr. Romney, Mr. Gingrich and Mr. Huntsman, who have all said that global warming is real and at least tentatively attributed it to human actions, would suffer for it in the Republican primaries.

Mr. Perry's anti-E.P.A. stance has been popular with Republicans in Texas and could carry him far in the primaries, said Ken Kramer, director of the <u>Texas chapter of the Sierra Club</u>. It may prove a liability in a general election, Mr. Kramer said.

"That kind of rhetoric is popular with a certain segment here," he said. "But a lot of other Texans, especially those in major cities with air pollution problems, are not necessarily supportive of the governor's war on the E.P.A."

He added, "My sense is there's definitely a difference between what plays well in Texas from a political standpoint and what plays well in other parts of country."

Mr. Paul holds rather more complex views of the environment and regulation. He generally favors a hands-off approach to federal regulation, although he has backed some tax incentives for clean energy development.

He opposes tax breaks for oil and gas companies but supports Arctic drilling. He is skeptical about climate change but said in 2008 that there were <u>unexplained anomalies</u> in global temperatures.

Mr. Romney's position may be the most complicated of all. In Massachusetts, he proposed plans to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and was a sponsor of a regional <u>carbon cap-and-trade</u> program. He has mostly backed away from those positions, but he says there is still an important place for regulation.

"I believe we should keep our air and our water clean," Mr. Romney said at <u>a town hall-style meeting</u> in New Hampshire last month.

"Do I support the E.P.A.?" he said. "In much of its mission, yes; but in some of its mission, no."

Despite a Supreme Court ruling to the contrary, Mr. Romney said the federal law did not give the agency authority to regulate carbon emissions. "I don't think that was the intent of the original legislation," he said, "and I don't think carbon is a pollutant in the sense of harming our bodies."

TEXT OF A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT TO THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

August 30, 2011

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Thank you for your letter of August 26, 2011. I agree that it is extremely important to minimize regulatory burdens and to avoid unjustified regulatory costs, particularly in this difficult economic period. I have taken a number of steps to achieve those goals.

Executive Order 13563, issued early this year, imposes a series of new requirements designed to reduce regulatory burdens and costs. As you are undoubtedly aware, this Executive Order also called for an ambitious Government-wide review of rules now on the books. The review was recently completed, producing reform plans from 26 agencies. A mere fraction of the initiatives described in the plans will save more than \$10 billion over the next 5 years; as progress continues, we expect to be able to deliver savings far in excess of that figure.

I would add that the costs of final, economically significant rules reviewed by the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs were actually higher in 2007 and 2008 than in the first 2 years of my Administration. And in 2009 and 2010, the benefits of such rules -- including not only monetary savings but also lives saved and illnesses prevented -- exceeded the costs by tens of billions of dollars.

Your letter draws attention to the rules listed on this year's regulatory agenda. Under both Republican and Democratic administrations, the agenda is merely a list of rules that are under general contemplation, provided to the public in order to promote transparency. Before any such rules can be issued, they must be subject to a long series of internal and external constraints, including the rulemaking requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act and the new burden-reducing, cost-saving requirements of Executive Order 13563. Many rules listed on an agenda, in any given year, are not issued.

You also ask for a list of pending rules that would cost over \$1 billion. As noted, the regulatory agenda includes a large number of rules that are in a highly preliminary state, with no reliable cost estimate. I can assure you that all rules that the Administration promulgates, including and especially the expensive rules, are very carefully scrutinized for conformity to the law and Executive Order 13563. 2

At the present time, seven rules have been proposed to the public with an estimated annual cost in excess of \$1 billion; they are listed as an appendix to this letter. Of course, these rules are merely proposed, and before finalizing any of them, we will take account of public comments and concerns and give careful consideration to cost-saving possibilities and alternatives.

I look forward to working closely with you to produce a regulatory system that will, in the words of Executive Order 13563, "protect public health, welfare, safety, and our environment while promoting economic growth, innovation, competitiveness, and job creation."



State of play: The Environmental Protection Agency sought to quell concerns Thursday that climate change regulations will face the same fate as an ozone rule that the White House <u>scuttled this month</u>.

EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson said Wednesday that the agency would <u>miss an end-of-September deadline</u> to propose greenhouse gas standards for power plants, but insisted the rules are still on track.

She <u>told San Francisco radio station KQED</u> on Thursday that the agency will "absolutely" continue moving ahead with the standards. EPA officials say they will announce a new schedule shortly.

EPA is seeking to rebut the notion that the delay stems from White House or other influences outside the agency Jackson told KQED that the delay was "not at all" a political decision, while spokeswoman Betsaida Alcantara t

E2 that "we are very much committed to proposing the standards."

The delay comes as greenhouse gas regulations and other EPA rules are under attack from Capitol Hill Republicans, who have called them "job killers."

The rules were scheduled to be proposed by Sept. 30 under a legal agreement between EPA and a group of environmentalists and states that had sued the agency under former President George W. Bush, who opposed climate regulations.

Environmental groups issued a flurry of statements Thursday decrying the new delay.

"Every day we delay cleaning up our nation's power plants fattens polluter profits and shrinks our chances of tackling the climate crisis. Today's decision suggests that when it comes to uncontrolled carbon pollution, the administration appears content with business as usual," said Joe Mendelson, the policy director for climate and energy programs at the National Wildlife Federation.

Jackson vows to crack down on coal, blasts GOP obstructionism

U.S. EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson today said her agency will fight to oversee the coal industry even as Republicans wage war on regulations, but she stopped short of explicitly supporting student-led efforts to shut down campus coal plants.

Many coal-fired power plants have neglected to update their equipment for decades, she said, and EPA plans to ensure they do so through new toxic emissions standards. Those standards -- which were recently delayed a month -- would make power plants use up-to-date technology to control mercury, heavy metals and acid gases by about Jan. 1, 2016.

"In their entire history -- 50, 60, 70 years, or even 30 ... they never found the time or the reason to clean up their act," Jackson said. "They're literally on life support. And the people keeping them on life support are all of us."

Jackson addressed students this morning at an event hosted by the Sierra Club and Howard University and highlighted efforts to switch schools to clean energy sources. So far, according to the Sierra Club, students have succeeded in closing 17 coal-fired power plants on campuses throughout the country. Environmentalists say the effort signals a trend of clean energy on campus (*Greenwire*, Feb. 28).

But the EPA administrator focused most of her comments on the harsh political environment in which EPA is functioning, with Republicans taking aim at "job-killing regulations" and the agency's authority to regulate greenhouse gases. The House has voted more than 160 times to block Clean Air Act rules, she said; recently, lawmakers took a series of votes to stop stricter air pollution limits for coal-fired power plants, industrial boilers and cement kilns.

Jackson summed up the political atmosphere with a reference to North Dakota Republican Sen. John Hoeven's bill to protect coal ash from regulations that would eliminate its use in concrete production.

"That struck me as kind of a way of thinking about what's going on right now inside the beltway," she said, later adding: "So that's where we are. We're protecting the coal ash from the people rather then protecting the people from the coal ash."

Later today, students will visit Capitol Hill and talk with White House Liaison to Young Americans Ronnie Cho in a closed meeting.

Keystone XL Pipeline Project Review Process: Decision to Seek Additional Information

Executive Order 13337 authorizes the Department of State to lead the review of Presidential Permit applications for transborder pipelines, granting the Department discretion in determining what factors to examine to inform a determination of whether the proposed project is in the national interest. Since 2008, the Department has been conducting a transparent, thorough and rigorous review of TransCanada's application for the proposed Keystone XL Pipeline project. As a result of this process, particularly given the concentration of concerns regarding the environmental sensitivities of the current proposed route through the Sand Hills area of Nebraska, the Department has determined it needs to undertake an in-depth assessment of potential alternative routes in Nebraska.

As part of the National Interest Determination process, the State Department held a public comment period, including public meetings in the six potentially affected states and Washington, D.C., to increase the opportunity for public comments. During this time, the Department also received input from state, local, and tribal officials. We received comments on a wide range of issues including the proposed project's impact on jobs, pipeline safety, health concerns, the societal impact of the project, the oil extraction in Canada, and the proposed route through the Sand Hills area of Nebraska, which was one of the most common issues raised. The comments were consistent with the information in the final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) about the unique combination of characteristics in the Sand Hills (which includes a high concentration of wetlands of special concern, a sensitive ecosystem, and extensive areas of very shallow groundwater) and provided additional context and information about those characteristics. The concern about the proposed route's impact on the Sand Hills of Nebraska has increased significantly over time, and has resulted in the Nebraska legislature convening a special session

to consider the issue.

State law primarily governs routes for interstate petroleum pipelines; however, Nebraska currently has no such law or regulatory framework authorizing state or local authorities to determine where a pipeline goes. Taken together with the national concern about the pipeline's route, the Department has determined it is necessary to examine in-depth alternative routes that would avoid the Sand Hills in Nebraska in order to move forward with a National Interest Determination for the Presidential Permit.

Based on the Department's experience with pipeline project reviews and the time typically required for environmental reviews of similar scope by other agencies, it is reasonable to expect that this process including a public comment period on a supplement to the final EIS consistent with NEPA could be completed as early as the first quarter of 2013. After obtaining the additional information, the Department would determine, in consultation with the eight other agencies identified in the Executive Order, whether the proposed pipeline was in the national interest, considering all of the relevant issues together. Among the relevant issues that would be considered are environmental concerns (including climate change), energy security, economic impacts, and foreign policy.







Frank O'donnell just sent the below email to his list - claiming OMB is pushing us to weaken the mercury standard from 1.2 to 1.42 - this is gaining traction very fast. Reporters - including WSJ and Wash Post, soon to be followed by others - are writing.

Here's the email:

We have promised to keep our ear to the ground on the fierce lobbying on the EPA mercury/air toxic rule for power plants. There is an excellent story in today's National Journal, but here is the very latest:

We are informed reliably that the White House Office of Management and Budget, at the behest of the coal-burning electric power industry, is now pushing the EPA to weaken its mercury pollution control requirements in its upcoming toxic pollution rule for power plants. Power companies could emit almost 20% more mercury under the dirty power industry scheme being promoted by OMB bean counters.

This is nothing short of outrageous. The White House should immediately disavow this latest attempt by OMB staffers to front for dirty industry. (You will recall the recent excellent report by the Center for Progressive Reform on the topic of OMB, its meetings with industry, and its impact on EPA.

In this case, the real culprit is the dirty power industry, which continues to push not only for delays and loopholes, but for the right to spew out more toxic mercury. <u>http://switchboard.nrdc.org/blogs/fbeinecke/say no to polluters call to we.html</u>

The push for weaker standards initially came from the so-called Utility Air Regulatory Group, which called last August in its official comments to EPA for a weakening of the proposed mercury standard from 1.2 lb/TBtu to 1.42 – or going roughly from a 91% mercury control requirement to about 75%. This change would mean thousands of additional pounds of toxic mercury being spewed into the environment each year.

The current push is being driven principally by Southern Company and American Electric Power Company because they apparently believe a weaker standard would cost them less. Some trade off: more brain poisons so a couple of big companies could save a few bucks.

We have promised to keep our ear to the ground on the fierce lobbying on the EPA mercury/air toxic rule for power plants. There is an excellent story in today's National Journal, but here is the very latest:

We are informed reliably that the White House Office of Management and Budget, at the behest of the coal-burning electric power industry, is now pushing the EPA to weaken its mercury pollution control requirements in its upcoming toxic pollution rule for power plants. Power companies could emit almost 20% more mercury under the dirty power industry scheme being promoted by OMB bean counters.

This is nothing short of outrageous. The White House should immediately disavow this latest attempt by OMB staffers to front for dirty industry. (You will recall the recent excellent report by the Center for Progressive Reform on the topic of OMB, its meetings with industry, and its impact on EPA.

In this case, the real culprit is the dirty power industry, which continues to push not only for delays and loopholes, but for the right to spew out more toxic mercury. <u>http://switchboard.nrdc.org/blogs/fbeinecke/say no to polluters call to we.html</u>

The push for weaker standards initially came from the so-called Utility Air Regulatory Group, which called last August in its official comments to EPA for a weakening of the proposed mercury standard from 1.2 lb/TBtu to 1.42 – or going roughly from a 91% mercury control requirement to about 75%. This change would mean thousands of additional pounds of toxic mercury being spewed into the environment each year.

The current push is being driven principally by Southern Company and American Electric Power Company because they apparently believe a weaker standard would cost them less.

Some trade off: more brain poisons so a couple of big companies could save a few bucks.

Internal FERC emails show rift with EPA over utility MACT

Internal emails between FERC and the White House show that the EPA may have discounted Energy Department concerns about how its mercury and air toxics rule for power plants could affect power grid reliability.

FERC officials were also frustrated with EPA's intransigence on the issue during the draft rule phase, according to the emails.

"I don't think there is any value in continuing to engage EPA on the issues," FERC senior economist David Kathan wrote in a March <u>email</u>. "EPA has indicated that these are their assumptions and have made it clear" that they will not change "anything on reliability or gas availability in the proposed rule."

"As it has done in other responses, EPA continues to make a lot of assumptions and does not directly answer anything associated with local reliability," Kathan wrote. "They provide the standard response that there will be enough time and they are confident that regional processes will accommodate any local capacity deficiency problem early in the process, or they do not directly respond to the question."

EPA is expected to issue its utility MACT rule on Friday, per a court agreement.

The requirements of the rule will lead to the closure of many coal-fired power plants, and idling of some coal-fired power generation units. Partisan fervor has risen in recent months over concerns that the pollution-control requirements will have dramatic impacts on electric reliability.

House Oversight and Government Reform Committee leaders cited internal FERC and OMB emails to say that EPA shirked its responsibility to appropriately consider reliability concerns.

Chairman Darrell Issa (R-Calif.) and Regulatory Affairs subpanel Chairman Jim Jordan (R-Ohio) sent a <u>letter</u> Tuesday to White House Office of Management and Budget regulatory chief Cass Sunstein citing the emails and asking that the rule be returned to EPA to more fully consider the impact on jobs and electric reliability.

Originally, EPA mentioned concerns about reliability in its draft, requesting comment on the issue. But on March 3, while the draft rule was under review, Ellen Brown of FERC sent an email to OIRA expressing concern that EPA was planning to ask commenters to "opine on the scope of our authority to ensure compliance with our regulations," according to the <u>emails</u>.

So EPA removed the request from comment before releasing the rule.

Doing so without requesting input from other FERC offices or commissioners, the committee said in the letter to Sunstein, "does a disservice to the rulemaking process."

During the March interagency review of the proposed rule, the Energy asked EPA to change a notation that it "has worked closely" with FERC and DOE on the potential impacts to reliability to say "will continue to work" with the agencies.

"In light of this new information, we are writing to request that the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs immediately return the utility MACT rule to EPA and require that EPA and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission complete a proper assessment of the rule that includes an analysis of its impact on grid reliability," the House letter says.

EPA has repeatedly said that it will allow flexibility to ensure that FERC's reliability needs are met, and also notes that independent assessments of the outcome of EPA's air toxics rules tends to overstate the rules' requirements.

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
