## **Background:**

The National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) was established under the Environmental Management & Coordination Act (EMCA, 1999)

#### **Purpose:**

To exercise general **supervision** and **co-ordination** over all matters related to the environment and be the **Principal Instrument of Government** in the implementation of all policies relating to the environment.

NEMA became operation on 1<sup>st</sup> July 2002

#### **Objectives:**

- To create awareness and educate the public on environmental issues or a proposed action
- To identify roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders
- To receive feedback from the public on the environmental issue
- To enhance understanding and ownership of the public

## **Legal Provisions for Public Participation**

#### Under EMCA,1999:

**PP** entrenched in the Act among five guiding principles;

- i) Polluter pays Principle
- ii) Precautionary Principle
- iii) Principle of public participation in the development of policies, plans and processes for the management of the environment
- iii) Cultural and traditional principle
- iv) Principle of international corporation in the management of environmental resources
- v) Principle of inter-generational and intra-generational equity

# Legal provisions conti...

#### **Constitution:**

- Kenya is implementing a new Constitution promulgated in August 2010. The Constitution has elevated environment;
- **Preamble: C**alls for the protection of environment as national heritage
- Article 42 (Bill of Right) –Gives every person in Kenya a right to a clean and healthy environment
- Articles 69,70, 72: Stipulates actions and obligations by State on the protection of environment
- **Public participation:** PP to be observed in key state actions such as, national budgeting process, selection & vetting of state officers earmarked to hold public office on integrity

### **Key Public Participation Forums**

- Public Hearings: Step in EIA Licensing Process which seeks views of the public on proposed project that become controversial
- Environmental Events & Activities: NEMA invites the public and relevant stakeholders to participate global environmental events and other diverse activities at national level. These include, clean-up exercises, tree planting exercises, waste recycling, exhibitions among others.

Environmental Events & activities serve as outreach avenues bringing together a captive audience to create awareness on diverse environmental issues



#### PP Forums conti...

#### Sensitization Forums for targeted stakeholders:

- NEMA conducts specific sensitization forums thro Education & Awareness Dept on various environmental regulations for targeted stakeholders who are directly implementing the laws.
- These forums raise awareness and educate stakeholders on legal requirements and the obligations for the specific sectors.
- Invitation for comments on EIA Reports prior to licensing by NEMA from the public



## **Challenges to Public Participation**

- Inadequate financial resources to hold enough engagements forums aimed at up-scaling awareness programmes and increase number of stakeholders sensitized.
- Poor public attitude towards the environment leading to irresponsible actions, negligence, lack of compliance to environmental standards causing pollution to the environment
- Inadequate media coverage of environmental issues due to competing news especially politics
- High publication costs to procure media spacema

## **Interventions:**

- Lobbying Treasury for additional budgetary allocations
- Devolution of NEMA offices to the newly established Counties to bring services closer to the people
- Decentralized medium and low risk licensing regimes to regions to reduce delays. NEMA HQs only handles the massive projects with high risk
- Collaboration with Development Partners
- Enhanced Public Private Partnerships(PPPs) through CSRs for environmental activities dubbed, Greening CSRs
- Enhanced partnership with Media Houses through press/ conference, releases, invitation to cover environmental events

- Enhanced financial resources to undertake more public participation forums
- Partnership with media in publishing environmental information
- Strengthening of NEMA County/sub-county
   offices through provision of office space
   (hire/build), vehicles, computes, furniture,
   connectivity and stationary to ensure efficient
   operations as complete units.



# Conclusion

- PP is an important tool for supporting environmental decision-making thus agencies must invest in the same
- PP should be practiced as a continuous engagement within and outside project settings at all levels
- PP has potential to enhance compliance to standard and improve quality of the environment
- Stakeholder analysis required prior to implementation of any projects or action to enhance ownership and sustainability while maximizing positive impacts for the environment
