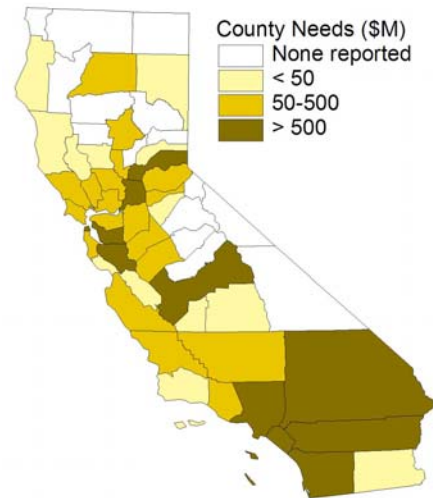




California Clean Watersheds Needs Survey 2008

The Clean Watersheds Needs

Survey (CWNS) is a comprehensive assessment of needs¹ to meet the water quality and water-related public health goals of the Clean Water Act (CWA). States and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) conduct the CWNS every four years under CWA Section 516 (b). California documented needs totaling \$30.0 billion in 2008. This is a 17 percent increase from the \$25.6 billion in needs documented in 2004.

All needs are in January 2008 dollars.

Wastewater Treatment Facilities

The enactment of the Clean Water Act (CWA) in 1972 resulted in dramatic improvements in the:

- Number of wastewater treatment plants.
- Percentage of the population served by wastewater treatment plants.
- Quality of effluent treatment from wastewater treatment facilities.

In 2008, 91% of California residents received centralized wastewater treatment services at the secondary, advanced, or no discharge treatment level, compared to 32% in 1972.
