


Scope of the Federal Pesticide Containment Regulations

The purpose of this document is to help you determine whether the federal containment regulations require you to have a secondary containment unit and/or a containment pad.

1. Do I need a secondary containment unit?




*NOTE: A stationary pesticide container is a refillable container that is fixed at a single facility or establishment, or if not fixed that remains at a facility for 30 consecutive days or more and holds pesticide the entire time.

**NOTE: The following Exempt Containers are not required to be in secondary containment:

- 1. Empty containers;
- 2. Containers holding rinsate or wash water (and are labeled to indicate this);
- 3. Containers holding gaseous pesticides at normal atmospheric pressure; and
- 4. Containers dedicated to non-pesticide use (and are labeled to indicate this).

2. Do I need a containment pad?



*Containment pad requirements **DO NOT apply** if the pesticide is dispensed from **containers LESS than 500 gallons (liquid) or 4,000 pounds (dry) for USE, APPLICATION** or purposes other than refilling for sale or distribution.

You Must Have Containment Pad.**

- ** Dispensing areas are **Exempt** from needing a containment pad if:
- 1. You only have gaseous pesticides;
- 2. You only have stationary containers already protected by a secondary containment unit; AND/OR
- 3. The area is used only for dispensing from a (non-stationary) rail car (in place less than 30 days).
