The Five Basic Files

- Unit Availability File (UAF) ertac_initial_uaf.csv
 - Backbone of the tool
 - Unit level data
 - Sources: CAMD, EIA, NEEDS, State Staff
- Controls File ertac_control_emissions.csv
 - Unit level data for SO2 and NOx
 - Emission rates or control efficiencies
- Growth Rates File ertac_growth_rates.csv
 - Growth rates by region and fuel unit type
 - Annual based on EIA reference case (AEO 2013)
 - Peak based on NERC
- Input Variables File ertac_input_variables.csv
 - A variety of variables that can be changed for each region and fuel unit type
 - Many deal with new, planned units or GDUs
- CAMD Hourly Base Year Data camd_hourly_base.csv

The Four "Extra" Files

- Seasonal Controls File ertac_seasonal_control_emissions.csv
 - Unit level data for SO2 and NOx
 - Allows the seasonal manipulation of SO2 or NOx rates
 - Only one year must be provided
 - All years after the provided year that are modeled will use the same rates
- NonCAMD Hourly Base ertac_hourly_noncamd.csv
 - Will add or edit existing hourly data
 - Useful for adding additional units that don't report to CAMD
 - Corrections of existing data (negative values, eg)
- Group Total Listing group_total_listing.csv
 - Provides regional SO2 and NOx emission levels to the program
 - Outputs a comparison of summed SO2 and NOx for the defined regions (estimated vs supplied levels)
- State Total Listing state_total_listing.csv
 - Provides state SO2 and NOx emissions levels to the program
 - Outputs a comparison of summed SO2 and NOx for the defined state (estimated vs supplied levels)

The Five Basic Files

Unit Availability File (UAF)

- A listing of the units that will be grown by the tool
- State supplied info: New units, retirements, fuel switches, simple cycle → combined cycle changes
 - Tool will NOT retire a unit w/o state input
 - Tool will NOT switch fuels at a unit w/o state input
- Other sources:
 - Unit Level CAMD info
 - NEEDS, EIA, other
- Some data are used by the tool. Other data are informational and provided to guide users and state staff. May be used in future tool upgrades.

UAF: Blank Columns

- Some of the columns in the input UAF should start blank unless they are needed because an existing unit has little or no BY data (more on that issue later)
- These columns are filled in by the toolyou can see results in the post processed UAF.
- If the tool is run with data already in the columns, then the data supplied in the UAF supplants the calculated data

UAF: Blank Columns

- Max_ertac_heat_input_hourly_summer
- Hourly_base_max_actual_heat_input
- Calculated_BY_UF
- Max_annual_ertac_UF
- Max_BY_hourly_gload or sload
- Calculated_BY_average_heat_rate
- ERTAC_heat_rate
- Unit_optimal_load_threshold
- Nominal_heat_rate

UAF: What is Needed For Existing Units?

- Existing unit: Unit that operated in the BY <u>only need 9</u>
 <u>columns</u> of data provided
- ORIS_plant_ID
- CAMD_unit_ID
 - Be careful, these are alphanumeric, and Excel likes to convert to numeric when importing a .csv or .txt file
 - Easy to lose leading zeros, and the ID must match what is in the CAMD hourly file
- State
- Facility_name
 - The program will provide a warning if state and facility_name in the UAF do not match what is in the CAMD hourly database
- ERTAC_region
 - Check the map if you are unsure of the facility's region
 - Google Earth is very helpful for this effort

9 UAF Columns for Existing Units, Con't

• BY_camd_hourly_data_type

- New, Full, Partial, Non-EGU
- If a unit is marked "full" but has an incomplete record set in the BY, the tool treats it like "partial" and tells you this in the pre-processor log

Online_start_date

- Did your unit start in the base year? (sometime in 2011, for example)
- If so, you can choose to set the online start date to 2012 and call it a new unit. This
 allows the tool to provide the unit a "typical" activity profile. This is useful if the base
 year's operations are not typical due to start up and you want the new unit to have
 reasonable activity during the entire year.
- Or, you can choose to set the online start date to the MM/DD/YY of start up (for example, 02/12/2011 and call the unit a "full" unit. This will tell the tool to use the 2011 data as the basis for the unit's FY activity.

Offline_start_date

- Both the online and offline_start_date may be a year rather than a month/day/year. If it is a year, the program assumes start up on the first day of the next year or on retirement on the last day of the particular year. Example, if the date is 2016, the program assumes the unit shuts down on December 31, 2016, or begins operations on January 1, 2017.
- For units not retiring, use a place holder of 2030
- ERTAC_fuel_unit_type_bin
 - Coal, Oil, Simple Cycle-Gas, Boiler-Gas, Combined Cycle-Gas
 - Use predominant fuel or operations of the unit to assign

SIDEBAR: What is a Non-EGU?

- Units report to CAMD for all sorts of reasons
 - RGGI, NBTP, CAIR, ARP, etc
- FY activity for some units may be better predicted using something other than EIA data
 - Units that don't send much electricity to the grid or provide steam to industrial processes
 - Units with nonstandard fuels (TDF, biomass for example)
- States make this determination
- Example: In VA, units at paper mills are marked as non-EGUs. Why?
 - Provide little or no electricity to the grid
 - Operations dependent on paper making
 - Better grown using paper industry-specific growth rates, which generally are not as aggressive as EIA growth rates

3 More Columns for Existing Units in the UAF

- These columns are *not required* for the projection to run
- Good to make sure they are provided. Best practice is to have these columns filled in for all units in the UAF.
 - Plant_latitude
 - Plant_longitude
 - These help the modelers to get the ERTAC-to-SMOKE post processor to work
 - If you <u>like your modelers</u>, make sure to include these data for all units that are EGUs
 - Max_unit_heat_input
 - Mmbtu/hr
 - Available from CAMD for every unit
 - Very helpful for the program to have this data; highly recommended to include for all units in UAF
 - May also be state-supplied
 - Helps tool to determine capacity of the unit

Existing Units with Little or No BY Data

- Some units in the BY provide little or no hourly data
 - May be data errors or incomplete data
 - May have simply not run very much or not at all
- BY data is needed so that a number of columns in the UAF may be calculated:
 - Max_annual ertac_UF (how much the unit operated in the BY)
 - Max_BY_hourly_gload/sload (how hard a unit can run)
 - Calculated_BY_average_heat_rate (average heat rate/efficiency)
 - Unit_optimal_load_threshold (where the unit likes to run)
 - A few others
- How do you identify these units?
 - Pre-processor log will provide a series of warnings regarding units without necessary BY data
 - The 2.3 and 2.4 reference cases have had these units ID'd and appropriate data supplied in the reference input files

Necessary Additional Columns for Existing Units with Little or No BY Data

- Max_unit_heat_input
 - Data from CAMD, permits or other sources
 - Suggested to be filled in for ALL units; mandatory for units with little/no BY data
- Max_annual_ERTAC_UF_state_input
 - How much should the unit be allowed to operate?
 - Default is 0.9
- Nominal_heat_rate
 - The ERTAC_heat_rate is the calculated BY heat rate, unless a nominal_heat_rate is supplied. Any value supplied in the nominal_heat_rate column is automatically used by the tool.
- Unit_max_optimal_load_threshold
 - This value is a judgment about where the unit likes to operate.
 - If sufficient BY data is available, will be calculated.
 - For units with little or no BY data, states must supply this value.
 - Can be estimated at about 80% of the maximum capacity of the unit, in MWs

UAF: 12 Columns Needed for New Units

• ORIS_plant_ID

- If a unit has not yet been assigned an ORIS, Wendy will assign a temporary number.
- Remember to tell ERTAC when the ORIS is assigned!
- CAMD_unit_ID
 - If the unit_ID is unknown at the time of the UAF development, tell Wendy and she will assign a temporary number.
 - Remember to tell ERTAC when the unit_ID is assigned!
- State
- Facility_name
- ERTAC_region
 - Use map to figure this out, and Google Earth
- BY_camd_hourly_data_type
 - Will be **NEW**

UAF: 12 Columns Needed for New Units

• Online_start_date

- Best guess as to the year it will start up
- If the online_start_date is during a projection year:
 - When only the year (e.g. 2017) is provided, the tool uses Jan 1 of the next year as the start date.
 - When providing MM/DD/YEAR (e.g. May 1, 2017), the tool starts the new unit on the next day (e.g. May 2, 2017).
- Offline_start_date
 - 2030
- ERTAC_fuel_unit_type_bin
- Max_unit _heat_input
 - From permit application? Maximum heat input in mmbtu/hr
- Nominal_heat_rate
 - From permit application?
 - Other potential defaults: 6,700 btu/kw-hr for CC; 9,000 btu/kw-hr for SC-gas; 9,000 btu/kw-hr for coal fired boilers; 11,000 btu/kw-hr for boiler-gas
- New_unit_flag
 - Include a "Y" for new units

UAF: Fuel Switching Units

- Occurring frequently these days mainly, <u>coal</u> units switching to <u>natural gas</u>
- Steps:
 - Retire the coal unit (Offline_start_date=201X)
 - Add a line in the UAF
 - Easy to copy line from the coal unit
 - Leave in all the lat long and other unit ID data (if you want to be nice to your modelers...)
 - Change the following items on the new line:
 - **BY_camd_hourly_data_type**: Change to NEW
 - Online_start_date: Make sure that the coal unit's offline_start_date is <u>prior</u> to the gas unit's online_start_date
 - Offline_start_date: 2030, unless the gas unit is also slated to retire in the future
 - ERTAC_fuel_unit_type_bin: Change from previous fuel to new fuel (Boiler Gas, for example)
 - Nominal_heat_rate: As a new unit, the unit needs a nominal_heat_rate. Maybe 11,000 or 12,000 btu/kw-hr for Boiler-Gas fuel-switched units
 - New_unit_flag: Change to Y
 - Not necessary, but for clarity, you may want to clean up the informational columns to remove references to the old fuel and old operational practices
 - If you have any representative emissions data, you should include emission rates in the controls file for the new unit. <u>Best practice</u> to include those rates in the control file, if available.
- Same steps are used for a unit going from simple cycle \rightarrow combined cycle
 - In this case, be sure to update the unit's max_unit_heat_input and nominal_heat_rate for the combined cycle unit!

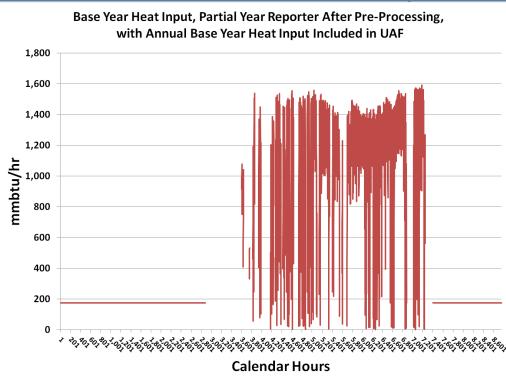

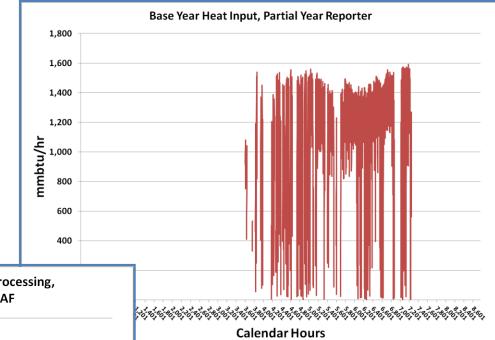
UAF: Partial Year Reporters

- Units that didn't report a full year of data in the BY=Partial year reporters
- BY_camd_hourly_data_type=Partial
- BY_Annual_HI_for_Partials
 - Optional
 - The base year annual heat input in mmbtu/yr
 - If provided, tool will subtract reported data from annual data
 - Non reported period will be assigned a flat temporal profile
- Units marked as Full but without a full year of data are treated as Partial units by tool
- Preprocessor log will detail each unit's status

UAF Partial Year Reporters

States may choose to supply annual activity (heat input) in UAF





Tool will create nonreported time period's profile, if data is supplied. Nonreported profile is flat.

UAF: Units with Annual Constraints

- Suppose a unit that operated freely in the BY has a FY constraint:
 - Consent order, permit requirement, other SIP requirement...
- Max_annual_ERTAC_UF_state_input=range from >0 to <1
 - Value limits the total annual amount of power the unit may produce.
 - For instance, a unit that has maximum capacity of 100 MW can theoretically produce 876,000 MW-hrs of power (100 MW x 8760 hrs/yr). If the unit_annual_capacity_limit=.5, the unit will be capped at 438,000 MW-hrs of power in the FY.
- Did a lot of work with this in a recent series of trials for SRVC-works very well.

UAF: Unused Fields

- A couple fields aren't yet filled in because the code has not yet been updated for a particular functionality
 - Other_consuming_regions: For updates to code that will allow power from the unit to flow to other regions than the ERTAC_region
 - Max_ertac_heat_input_hourly_winter: for units like GTs where capacity may depend on seasonal temperature and humidity
 - Unit_minimum_optimal_load_threshold: for units to be turned off in any particular hour where the load drops below reasonable levels
- At this time, these fields are not being used. Just ignore them.
- When tool updates become available that uses these fields, the ERTAC Users Group (you) will get email about it.

UAF: Other Considerations

- Heat Rates are important!
 - The pre processor log flags units with calculated BY heat rates outside the range of 3,000-20,000 btu/kwhr.
 - For these units, you may want to examine the calculated heat rate supplied in the log
 - If the calculated heat rate is not representative, supply reasonable heat rate in nominal_heat_rate column.
 - Comparing 1.7 (2007) and 2.0 (2011) BY results shows that heat rates do change some—can affect capacity
- Any changes you want in the master files should be submitted to <u>ERTACEGUFeedback@gmail.com</u>.

DISCUSSION: So, what could we do with the UAF? What questions could we ask?

Controls File

- Very simple structure
- Control data only affects emissions; does NOT affect activity
 - The Tool WILL NOT apply control w/o state input!
- In areas that are sensitive, it's a good idea to closely manage emission rates of large emitters using the control file
 - Historic nonattainment areas, maintenance areas, etc.
- Pre-processing log file checks this input file
 - Are the ORIS/Unit IDs listed in the UAF?
 - Do dates overlap?
 - Are start dates after the BY?
 - EFs with start dates before and during the BY are not used by the tool
 - Pre-processor log warns of this situation

Controls File

- Pre-processing log file checks this input file
 - Are the ORIS/Unit IDs listed in the UAF?
 - Do dates overlap?
 - Are start dates after the BY?
 - EFs with start dates before and during the BY are not used by the tool
 - Pre-processor log warns of this situation
- For NEW units, including fuel-switched units, <u>best practice</u> is to include NOx and SO2 emission rates in lbs/mmbtu for the new units in the controls file
 - Otherwise, you take your chance on what the tool estimates.....

- Blue columns are needed for processing
- May submit either emission rate or control efficiency
 - If both are submitted, emission rate is used
 - For new or fuel-switched units, emission rate rather than control percentage is needed (no BY data to which the control efficiency may be applied!)
 - Be careful applying NOx control efficiencies-the control is applied to both OS and Non OS rates.
- Orange columns are very helpful, but the code will process the data with blanks in these columns

Control File Updates

- If you think the BY is a pretty accurate reflection of EFs to be used in the FY, no control files information is needed.
- If you think in the FY, the unit will be operated differently, apply that data to the controls file.

DISCUSSION: So, what could we do with the Controls File? What questions could we ask?

Input_Variables File

- Allows users to adjust various calculations within the tool
- ERTAC users group has not done extensive tests on the affects of these variables.
- Ozone_Season_Start_Date/Ozone_Season_End_Date
 - Allows user the option to change the ozone season for a particular region
 - In case future regulations change this period

• Hourly_Hierarchy

- Hourly hierarchy based on BY demand
- Calculations can differ between hourly, siz-hour and 24 hour estimates
- Allows users to choose which methodology to apply to each region and fuel unit type bin

• New_Unit_Max_Size/New_Unit_Min_Size

- These values regulate the way generation deficit units are parsed in a region.
- Example: A region needs 500 MW of generation. The Max size is 120 MW and the min size is 50 MW. The program will create four 12 MW units and one 50 MW unit (total 530 MW of generation).

• Demand_Cushion

- Allows users to change the generation deficit in a region
- Tool will multiply the deficit by the cushion and create that amount of generation to meet demand

Input_Variables File, Continued

• Facility #1 through Facility #10

- If these are blank, tool will place GDUs at facilities in capacity order (highest capacity first)
- If the user doesn't like these locations (perhaps the first few facilities are located in nonattainment areas, the user can specify up to 10 ORIS IDs. The tool will place the GDUs at these locations, in order from #1 to #10.

• Maximum_Annual_ERTAC_UF

- What is the maximum a unit in that region and fuel unit type bin may run, annually?
- Default is 0.9 (90% of annual capacity)
- This value may be changed on a unit basis in the UAF

• Capacity_Demand_Deficit_Review

- Tool processes FY generation in hierarchy order
- The hour set here is where the tool stops and checks to see if FY demand is being met by FY capacity.
- Unit_Optimal_Load_Threshold_Determinant
 - The percentile of the unit's operation that is assigned as the optimal load
 - Used for assigning excess generation to other units
- Proxy_%_(for_coal_only)
 - Sets the level of operation of new, planned or GDU coal fired units
 - Percentage of maximum capacity

Input_Variables File, Continued

• New_Unit_Percentile_for_placement_in_the_unit_ allocation_hierarchy

- Places new, planned units and GDUs in the unit hierarchy.
- Since mimic unit is the unit just below the new unit in the hierarchy, this value also selects the mimic unit.
- Percentile_for_emission_factor_calculations_for_new_units
 - Also for GDUs
 - Chooses unit in the region and fuel unit type bin ranked emission rate at this percentile for new, planned unit EFs or GDUs
 - EFs supplied by states in controls file for new units overrides this value
 - Units are ranked separately for:
 - Annual SO2 EF (lbs/mmbtu)
 - OS NOx EF (lbs/mmbtu)
- Percentile_for_maximum_heat_input_hourly_calculations
 - Hourly heat input data can have distortions
 - Substitution
 - Other reporting issues
 - Using the maximum hourly heat input value can vastly over estimate unit size
 - Industry representatives suggested having a mechanism to adjust the maximum unit size based on hourly heat input data

Input_Variables: Four Fields Not Currently Being Used

- Generic_SO2_control_efficiency
- Generic SCR NOx control lbs/mmbtu
- Generic SNCR NOx control lbs/mmbtu
- Unit minimum optimal load threshold percentile
- Tool has not been upgraded to use these data, yet

- Green shaded columns may be blank.
- These columns tell the tool where to place GDUs.
- If the columns are blank, the tool uses capacity size of existing units to locate GDUs, if GDUs are needed.

Growth Rates

- Input files 2.3 (2011) represent reference case data
 - AEO 2014 for annual growth rates
 - NERC 2013 for peak growth rates
- Transition hours represent the hierarchical hour where the tool transitions from peak to non peak growth rate estimates
 - Generally set at 10/50 for non-coal and 200/2000 for coal
 - Experimented with elongating these points for non-coal, and particularly combined cycle
 - As combined cycle becomes more of a base load technology, will need to evaluate a range similar to 200/2000 for those units

- Green columns are required to be filled in
- NonPeak_Growth_Rate must be blank; program calculates this value and supplies it in the post-processed file
- Right now, "Linear" is the only option for Interpolation Method. There is some thought that eventually the tool might offer other choices, like parabolic or bell curve, and use a different formula.

BY Hourly CAMD File

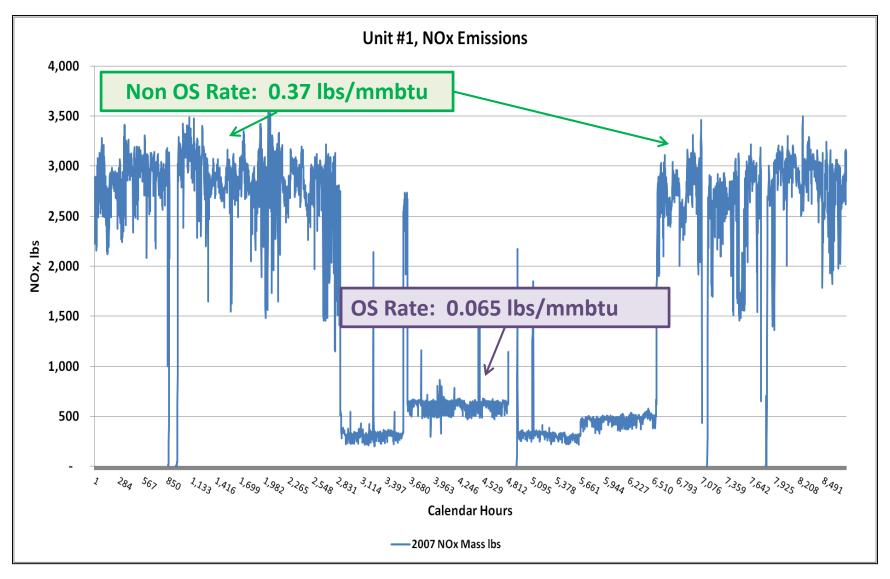
- The hourly data files are available from EPA on their FTP site.
- Contains every hour of CAMD data for the BY (2011 for CONUS 2.3) for every unit reporting to CAMD
 - 4,000+ units
- The file is large—about 4GB.
- Since the tool allows regional runs, running a region can be a lot easier for those using laptops
- ERTAC has a BY Hourly CAMD file available on the MARAMA FTP for those who'd like to try a CONUS run

The Four "Optional" Input Files

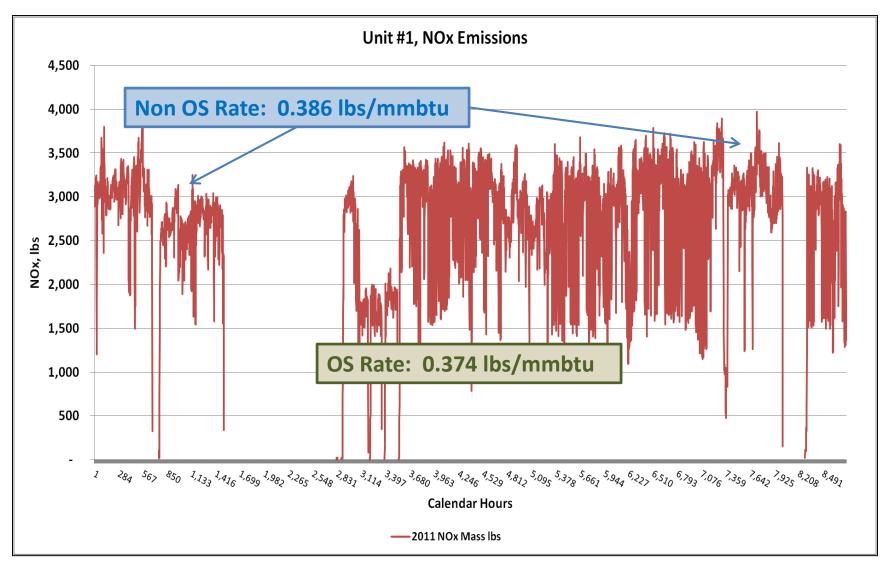
Seasonal Controls File

- Very useful file-for CONUS runs, you can expect to include a version of this file in your trials
- In both the 2007 (v1.7) and 2011 (v2.0) BYs, some units operated controls in a seasonal manner.
 - SCR on and running hard during May-Sept, for example
 - Other months, SCR running less or offline
- Some units operated the controls in very different manners between the two years
- If no control file emission rates are provided, BY OS and Non OS rates will be used in the FY.
 - Why is this important? See next two slides...

Seasonal Controls File

- Allows the user to manipulate the FY emission rate by pollutant of a unit down to monthly increments
- GA and VA Examples
 - Supplied OS and Non OS NOx EFs in control file
 - Best estimate of future operations

Seasonal Control File Data

- States communicate the seasonal nature of the controlled rates in the controls file-the ERTAC team translates that info to the seasonal controls file.
 - In the <u>controls file</u> comments section, GA told the ERTAC Team to use these values for every projection year starting 2017.
 - In the controls file comments section, VA told the ERTAC Team to us these values for every projection year starting 2013.
- Using the seasonal controls file allows the user to input these values once, and then the tool will determine if the projection year should use these values, or average values.
 - For example, if the projection year is 2016, the tool would apply the VA values.
 - For 2016, the GA values would NOT be applied. For GA, the average BY emission rates for OS and non-OS would be used.
- Allows states to manage emissions of important units or high emitters
 - A lot of work on the states' part
 - Of value for high emitters and/or units located in or near sensitive areas

NonCAMD Hourly File

- This file allows the user to selectively edit hourly data in the BY hourly file
 - Any hours provided in the nonCAMD hourly file overwrite the hours for that ORIS/Unit ID in the BY hourly file from CAMD
 - Has been used for a number of purposes
- Also allows the user to append additional hourly data to the BY hourly file
 - Handy if a state wants to include a unit that should be grown as an EGU in one of the fuel/unit type bins
 - The unit might have hourly data available due to the presence of CEMS
 - Unit might be too small to trigger Part 75 CAMD reporting requirements

- These files provide info to the tool to allow comparison charts to be created by the tool as outputs.
- The data in these files does NOT affect projections of activity
- The data in these files do NOT affect projections of emissions
 - That might be a future upgrade

- Output will compare the projection year to the appropriate values by year.
 For example, FY 2018 values would be compared to those with Year
 Applicable equal to 2017 or 2018, but not 2019.

- No data for 2019 cap, since the projection year is 2018
- FY Emissions are summed automatically into the chart for the user to compare to the cap
- If the FY emissions are greater than the cap, the tool makes no effort to change emission rates.

- Tool will sum the emissions in the appropriate timeframe for the states in the group.
- Tool will NOT apply any additional control, beyond that supplied in the seasonal controls file and the controls file.
