- ▶ Butterflies



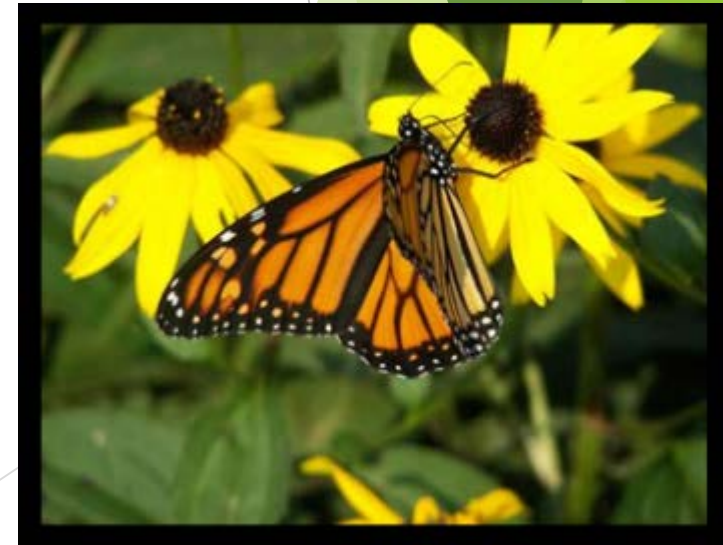

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EPA Region 9 Assistance to Develop Voluntary Pollinator Template for R9 Tribes

- ✓ R9 has approval to take the lead in developing a template, with significant input and feedback from tribes
- ✓ R9 has access to resources to incorporate into template development (such as state plans)
- ✓ R9 can coordinate across stakeholders



Next Steps

- ▶ Establish collaboration process
 - ▶ Collect caucus feedback
 - ▶ Regular conference calls or webinars to present progress and receive feedback
 - ▶ Coordinate with Tribal Pesticide Program Council (TPPC)
 - ▶ Status update presentations at RTOC meetings and Pesticide Workgroup calls
 - ▶ Draft template to be submitted to tribes for review by **9/30/2016**
 - ▶ Share template at annual conference (October 2016)
