Dear Ms. Wrona and Mr. Bourey:

We have found adequate for transportation conformity purposes the motor vehicle emission budget in the Revised MAG 1999 Serious Area Particulate Plan for PM-10 for the Maricopa County Nonattainment Area (February 2000). As a result of our adequacy finding, the Maricopa Association of Governments and the Federal Highway Administration must use this budget in future conformity analyses. This adequacy finding replaces the inadequacy finding we made on December 1, 1999.


On March 2, 1999 the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit issued a decision on *Environmental Defense Fund vs. the Environmental Protection Agency*, No. 97-1637, that we must make an affirmative determination that the submitted motor vehicle emission budgets contained in State Implementation Plans are adequate before they are used to determine the conformity of Transportation Improvement Programs or Long Range Transportation Plans. In response to the court decision, we are making any submitted SIP revision containing a control strategy plan available for public comment and responding to these comments before announcing our adequacy determination.

On December 28, 1999, ADEQ submitted as a SIP revision the draft revised MAG Serious Area PM-10 plan for the Maricopa County nonattainment area. The draft plan identifies a regional motor vehicle emission budget of 58.6 metric tons of directly-emitted PM-10 per day for annual PM-10 standard. The plan does not contain a budget for the 24-hour PM-10 standard. We announced receipt of the draft plan on the Internet and requested public comment by February 25, 2000. On February 16, 2000, we received the final revised MAG Serious Area PM-10 plan. The conformity budget, as well as the technical supporting documentation, in the final plan is unchanged from the draft plan. The comment period on the draft plan was extended to March 1, 2000 due to a temporary shutdown of Internet access to the public near the end of the comment period. We received no comments on the plan.

This letter transmits our decision that the final revised MAG PM-10 Plan is adequate for transportation conformity decisions for the annual standard. After reviewing the plan, we have preliminarily determined that it will provide for expeditious attainment of the annual PM-10 standard in the greater Phoenix area. We have detailed our adequacy determination in the enclosure and will soon post this information on the Internet at: [www.epa.gov/oms/transp/conform/pastsips.htm](http://www.epa.gov/oms/transp/conform/pastsips.htm). We will also announce this adequacy determination in the Federal Register. This determination will become effective 15 days after the Federal Register announcement.

Chapter 8, Demonstration of attainment status, describes how the level of emissions contained in the motor vehicle budget, with all other emission sources, will show attainment of the standards by December 31, 2006 with a peak annual concentration of 49.8 $\mu\text{g}/\text{m}^3$ and a peak 24-hour concentration of 149.3 $\mu\text{g}/\text{m}^3$ . Attainment is based on reductions from Maricopa County's Rule 310 and Rule 310.01, paving of unpaved roads, and sweeping of paved roads and controls and commitments to adopt controls on agricultural emissions.
