# Opportunity to see a public sculpture at the newly-expanded San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA) – 30 min. tour

The recently reopened and greatly-expanded SFMOMA is one block from the EPA R9 office, at the corner of Howard and Third Street. Here is the website: <u>https://www.sfmoma.org/</u>

At the Howard Street entrance there is a large room that holds a huge metal sculpture by Richard Serra titled *Sequence* that is free to view and walk inside – here is a photo: <u>https://www.sfmoma.org/artwork/FC.795</u> An excerpt from the description: *"Sequence* consists of two vast, torqued steel ellipses connected by an S-shape to create a winding path through which we experience the sculpture's massive leaning walls and graceful curves." Many have compared the experience to walking through a slot canyon – it's powerful.

Sara Bartholomew, RTOC rep from the Air Division, has offered to lead a short tour to see this sculpture (it will take approx. 30 mins. to walk over and go through the sculpture). She will leave from the front lobby (by the security gate) at these times:

- At the beginning of the lunch break on Wednesday 8/10, at 11:45am
- After the meeting on Wednesday 8/10, at 4:30pm

Of course, anyone is welcome to walk over and see the sculpture on their own time. The public space is open from 9am to 5pm each day. The museum is open from 10am to 5pm each day, and until 9pm on Thursdays. The cost of entry is \$25 for adults, \$22 for Seniors.

One highlight of SFMOMA is the new green/living wall: "At thirty feet high and 4,400 square feet in expanse, it's currently the largest living wall in the United States." Here is a video describing its creation: https://www.sfmoma.org/watch/the-living-wall/
