## **Greater Transparency: Expanding and Improving Data.gov Inventories**

- Published 73 new datasets on Data.gov including new Toxics Release Inventory data, ENERGY STAR, Gulf
  of Mexico oil spill, and compliance datasets
- Updated 1,392 previously published datasets
- Participated in the Energy and Safety Communities of Data.gov, providing data resources for community data jam and datapalooza events

# Making More Data Available: Supporting the Administration's Digital Strategy

- Established a Digital Strategy <u>webpage and posted an update</u> of EPA's efforts to meet strategy milestones and deliver better digital services to the public
- Agency names Envirofacts, Regulations.gov, and the Facility Registry System (FRS) as the customer-facing services to make compliant with new open data, content, and web application programming interface (API) policy
- Agency names How's My Waterway, Integrated Health Alerts, EPA.gov, and FRS as candidates to optimize for access by mobile devices



# Leveraging Partnerships and Technology: FOIAonline (Formerly FOIA Module)

- EPA worked with partners at the Department of Commerce and National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) to develop the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA)online service
- The functionality will allow the public to initiate and track a FOIA request, file an appeal, and search/view other requests
- FOIAonline will also produce the FOIA reports agencies are required to produce annually
- The system is slated to launch on October 1, 2012 (next quarter)

## Protecting the Public: Additions to the Superfund National Priorities List (NPL)

- 12 Superfund sites were <u>added to the NPL for cleanup</u>, and 8 were proposed for the NPL
- "Cleaning up contamination is vitally important to the health of America's communities," said Mathy Stanislaus, assistant administrator for EPA's Office of Solid Waste and Emergency Response. "Putting clean land back into productive use leads to increases in property values, generates new jobs and creates a stronger local economy that will strengthen these communities for years to come."

- Held Environmental Justice conference in Atlanta
- Announced <u>public comment period</u> for the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) Clean-up Phase 3 Plan
- Held <u>public meeting</u> for the cleanup plan for the White Chemical Corporation Superfund site in Newark, New Jersey
- Kicked off Third Annual <u>Energy Star National Building Competition</u>
- <u>Sought candidates</u> for the Advisory Board on Great Lakes issues

### Partnering Across Government and with Industry: Restoring the Everglades

- The Administration released a report outlining the <u>historic Federal investments and progress</u> made in Everglades restoration and announced \$80 million in additional funding to support farmers and ranchers who voluntarily conserve wetlands on agricultural land in the Northern Everglades Watershed.
- Work to restore the Everglades is a partnership with the State of Florida, Tribal governments, local governments, private landowners and industry through voluntary programs, and other Federal agencies including the Department of Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of Agriculture's Wetlands Reserve Program, and the Army Corps of Engineers.
- Funding includes continuation of projects such as an easement on a property known as American Prime, a key habitat corridor for the endangered Florida panther. A female panther and two kittens were recently photographed near this property -- the first documented evidence of a female Florida panther that far north since 1973.

## Partnering Across Government and with Industry: Other Examples

- Provided <u>environmental education grant</u> to Syracuse University to support 30 projects
- <u>Co-hosted 3rd annual Symposium</u> on Sustainable Environmental Practices at Colleges and Universities
- Signed the newly amended Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement with Canada
- Joined the City of Atlanta, Department of Housing and Urban Development, and Department of Transportation in <u>marking the third anniversary of the Partnership for Sustainable Communities</u>
