Opportunities Gaming Area

- Energy Efficient Lighting/LED conversions (slot machines/exit lights)
 - 50% less energy
 - Last longer
 - Do not contain mercury
 - Cool to the touch reduce HVAC load
- Cashless machines
 - Eliminates plastic containers
 - Requires less energy
- Re-Used decks of cards
 - Sold in gift shops
 - Placed in hotel room for guest usage

 Use glassware instead of bottled water and cans plastic cups


